



News from the North Devon Record Office (www.devon.gov.uk/record_office.)

The North Devon Record Office, based in Barnstaple Library, houses a veritable treasure trove of information relating to the local history of the northern Devon area. Original, handwritten documents dating from the twelfth century onwards are available for visitors to consult in our public search room and the office forms part of the North Devon Local Studies Centre offering a wide range of local and family history research source material, such as parish registers, local newspapers and census returns.

At the moment we are participating in an exciting new project called the **North Devon Adult Learning Forum** (or ALF for short), which has established a local network of providers of cultural services, including the Record Office, museum service, North Devon Theatres, Northern Devon Coast & Countryside Service and the Yarner Trust. All these services have pooled their resources to provide a variety of informal learning opportunities for adults who may otherwise find it difficult to access such things. The package of learning opportunities includes family history research, looking after the countryside, archaeological investigation work, dance and movement, singing in a choir and trying out rural skills. They are aimed particularly at people who live in a very rural location, lone parents, carers or those with health difficulties and ALF can offer support for things like childcare and transport. The free sessions will take place all across northern Devon and the project runs until the end of March so if you would like to get involved, visit the website at **www.northdevonalf.org** to find out more, view the list of events on offer and book yourself on to the session of your choice.

We are part of the Devon county archives service provided by Devon County Council.



Blacklands by Belinda Bauer Corgi (£7.99)

Blacklands: Exmoor in Winter, the heather dark, the drizzle encompassing, and a solitary 12 year old boy, Steven, is trying to dig into the turf. Blacklands; the chilling internal landscape inhabited by Arnold Avery, a paedophile serial killer, who is responsible for the destruction of Steven's family. Nineteen years before, Steven's uncle Billy, then an 11 year old boy, disappeared in the short distance between the newsagents and his house. His body has never been found but it is assumed that he was one of Arnold

His body has never been found but it is assumed that he was one of Arnold Avery's victims buried on Exmoor. Steven's nan cannot accept that her favourite child will not come back and stares endlessly out of the front window. Steven's mum,her daughter , who has to try and keep the family together is tight-lipped and resentful. There is not much human warmth circulating in this house. Steven believes that if he can find Billy's body then everything will be alright. And so he digs-obsessively. He remembers what



one of the more sympathetic of the 'uncles' who pass through the house said' decide what you want and then work out how to get it'. When his efforts produce nothing but the jawbone of a sheep he decides to write to Arnold Avery in prison to ask for help in finding Billy. So begins a cryptic correspondence between these two . But is an innocent 12 year old who tells no-one what he is doing any match for a ruthless child killer?

The bleakness of the subject matter is balanced by the vividly portrayed, poignant character of Steven. Indeed he has not got much going for him in material terms, but he is determined, resourceful and infinitely courageous. And we root for him. This is a beautifully written novel and deserves its place in the new TV Book Club.


Bideford Music Club features local girl Ellie Laugherne

The Buzz's new venture! A section devoted to issues related to the environment. Climate Change, with all its alarming consequences, seems to be top of the agenda as we enter 2010. But, if those I've spoken to are anything to go by, most of us feel daunted, overwhelmed and helpless faced with the enormity of the challenge – what can we do, as individuals, to prevent the lemming-like race we seem to be engaged in towards our own destruction?

Then, just to confuse the issue and to add to our dilemma, there are those who tell us it's not really happening. I think our safest bet is to assume that it is and that, to some extent at least, it's 'our fault', because that gives us the power to do something about it.





This was launched in 2006.

In 2005 just two people began a series of informal talks and film screenings relating to Peak Oil and Climate Change. The result was such that the official 'unleashing' of TTT was attended by 400 people in Totnes.

The Open Space Technique. Using this, people have come forward to form working 'theme groups' in Food, Energy, Transport, Building and Housing, Economics and Livelihoods, **Local Government, Health and Wellbeing, Heart and Soul, Education and the Arts (**so far!) The group leaders sit on the TTT management team.

Their main aim over the next 12 - 24 months is to produce and begin to implement an **Energy Descent Action Plan (EDAP)**

Terminology:

Peak Oil: a term used to refer to the maximum extraction rate of oil, after which point the rate of extraction declines. World discovery of oil peaked in 1964 and has declined ever since. We are currently consuming more than six barrels of oil for every one we discover. There is a growing consensus that we are now approaching or are even at, the world oil peak.

Energy descent: This refers to a time, fast approaching, when the Age of Cheap Oil is over and world energy supplies have entered inexorable decline. It is a term favoured by people looking towards energy peak as an opportunity for positive change rather than an inevitable disaster. **Open Space Technique**: Open Space Events bring together a range of people to discuss issues around a central theme. The events are based around workshops that the participants create and manage themselves.

Tomato pasta and chicken

Ingredients: 900g chicken drumsticks 500g dried pasta Tin of chopped tomatoes 50g Tomato puree Some mixed herbs



Method:

Take the chicken drumsticks out of the packet and wash thoroughly under cold water.

Place them on an oven proof baking tray and put in oven on 180 c for approx 30 mins.

Put the pasta in a saucepan of boiling water and cook for 15mins or until soft.

In another saucepan put in the tinned tomatoes, tomato puree and mixed herbs and bring to the boil. Then simmer for 15mins or until thickened.

Drain the pasta once cooked and put back into saucepan.

Add the tomato sauce and stir well. Check the chicken is thoroughly cooked and get out of oven.



Auntie's Army

Being at home for the Christmas holiday has meant I've had the luxury of watching proper TV, something I don't do when I'm away at Uni. I say 'luxury', but I think that's probably a bit generous. I turned on the TV last Friday evening to the sound of Phillip Schofield screaming something about how it's going to be great to see lots of celebrities falling when attempting to dance on ice again... and I cringed.

As far as I'm concerned, only two good things come from ITV. The first is Coronation Street- which is simply brilliant (mock me as much as you like)- the second is Harry Hill's TV Burp, which mocks everything else that comes from the TV cesspit of populist nonsense.

That's why I think public service broadcasting is excellent, and I think as a nation we should be proud of the BBC- even if they did put on 600 hours of repeats this Christmas. The TV License, however, is something I believe we shouldn't be proud of. What with the evolution of technology, it has simply become outdated: according to its website. anyone who watches or records programmes 'as they're being shown on TV' needs a license. All very well, but these days if you've got a good internet connection you can watch live channel streams online. And if one of the dreaded enforcers come knocking and see you've not got a TV but have got a computer, they can't prove anything. (By the way, the enforcers- as much as they like to think they do- do not have any sort of warrant to check your home, so you are not obliged to let them in.)

The rule is completely unfair to the commercial companies; even if I choose just to watch non BBC programmes as they're being broadcast, I still have to pay the license fee, even though it's only the BBC that receive the money. Furthermore, the BBC choose to make the majority of their programming available on the iPlayer, which means scroungers-off-the-state like us students can legally download and watch material funded by the license fee, without having to pay it.

The ominously named Capita- the company contracted out to deal with fee collections- has come under scrutiny numerous times after allegations of unfair practice among their employees, the enforcers, who work on commission to go round making sure you're legal.

And the system's horrendously bureaucratic; because our student flat of five comprises five different tenancy agreements, each room (plus the communal area) must have its own license, whereas a five bedroom family house need only have one.

Clearly, it's time for change. A system where everyone pays a TV tax would make more sense; whatever it takes to keep the BBC viable. But if they keep making Hole in the Wall, I might change my mind. **Tom Collins**

News from The Burton Art Gallery & Museum

By the time you are reading this, the new Gallery brochure will have been distributed but it will be useful, perhaps, if I highlight a few of the main features; for those who do not yet have a copy, the following is definitely essential.

The main exhibition in gallery 1 from 21st Jan to 22nd February, is the Annual Schools Exhibition. This is by far the most colourful, creative and enjoyable of the year's events, and every parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle, cousin and friend of the children whose work is displayed, can feel justly proud of the talent on show. Apart from drawings and paintings, there is sculpture, textiles, collage, ceramics; every media available has been used to create unique works of art, by young people from 5 to 18 years of age.

In other parts of the Gallery there is a selection of paintings by two artists who lived and worked in the Cabin at Bucks Mills, situated half-way down the slipway to the beach. Their paintings reveal their love of the area, its cliffs and beaches, the landscape and village cottages. Judith Ackland, daughter of a Bideford doctor, and Mary Stella Edwards, her companion, had quite different, and identifiable painting styles, using watercolours to great effect. We consider them as the definitive North Devon style of drawing and painting, followed later by Sheila Hutchinson and many others. We are fortunate to have a large permanent collection of their works. Reference John Barry in my article of Buzz! February 2004

What is not published about John Barry is as intriguing as that published. Born in Washfield Tiverton in 1775 he latterly joined the Local Defence Volunteers thus ensuring he would not serve abroad. Howevver, aged thirty-four, he enlisted in the army for seven years. After being wounded, almost certainly at Albuera, he did not return to Tiverton, and for many years he lodged with 'Thomas Clatworthy of the Underway, Northam'. Why didn't he go back to Tiverton what was the medal he returned with, what was it for and why did he warrant the visit of a general?

In the 1851 National Census of Bideford John Barry is said to be seventy-six whilst on the same day in Tiverton there is a Mary Barry, Pauper widow also aged seventy-six. Was she I wonder John Barry's 'widow'? Why did he wait until he was thirty-four before joinig the army, did he desert his wife and is that why he didn't return to Tiverton?

When aged ninety-five, he was granted an 'out Chelse pension' allowing him to escape the 'indignity' of being in the workhouse and took lodgings at 2 Cooper Street Bideford. He died there on the thirtieth of January 1875 aged 101.



We are proposing to form a local history group which can build on the research already undertaken to prepare a history of Northam. Family History.

A Happy New Year to all you genealogists, who are now actively back into your research with all your new equipment and CDs and books. Christmas is wonderful!!! Another much under used set of records are the **Land Tax Assessments**.

For 3 centuries, land tax was levied every year on the value of freehold property. The surviving records, which are known as the land tax assessments, should list both occupiers (tenants and sub tenants) and the land owners from the 18th century onwards. In theory, land tax assessments go back to around 1692 and end in 1963. In practice, however, you are most likely to come across those of the 18th and 19th centuries. The best period is undoubtedly 1780 to 1832, which has a very good survival rate, because in those years a duplicate land tax assessment also served as the electoral register.

Unless your ancestors were land owners, it is unlikely that you will find much of interest in the assessments before 1780 as tenants and sub-tenants were not usually mentioned. I hope that you prove me wrong, so always check!

Far more useful are the assessments from 1780 to 1832. Information usually includes the names of all the land occupiers (from 1786) and a description of the properties (from 1826). With careful use, they can be used as a census substitute as virtually all heads of household will be listed. The main value is as a supplement to the parish records or if the parish registers are lost or destroyed. From 1832 when separate registers of electors came in, we can no longer rely on land tax because of its peculiar system of exemptions. Many bought their way out of it. A duplicate list of taxpayers was sent to London in 1798 and now resides at **Kew Ref. IR23.**

Other records do exist but not in readily available forms, such as bundles of accounts, or arranged by hundred or divisions. Some are arranged in townships and much easier to refer to. So do go and enquire at the Record Office. The list of the whole country for **1798** is at Kew. Ref. IR23 and is arranged by parish. IR22 & IR23 might be more interesting as they include maps, plans and exemptions. Earlier assessments could turn up in Record Offices, Libraries, Parish Chests etc. .The next meeting of The North Devon Family History Group is on 20th Feb at the Burton Art Gallery 2pm -4pm.
