good quality shoe shop and an excellent book shop. Add to that several coffee shops and restaurants and three high class jewellers and a superb music shop.

This is just for starters. Not too bad in these difficult times and with a town competing with the nearby High Street shopping experience of Barnstaple and Exeter.

Helping local people

Independents' day

Bideford has a high proportion of good quality independent retailers but often local residents are too quick to put their town down. They assume that there is nothing here as there are few national chains, and people are often oblivious to what is actually available. The internet is undoubtedly useful and has its place, but unfortunately it has become the shopping default setting for a lot of people. They then miss out on the experience of dealing with locally owned businesses where the owners and their staff usually have a real passion and depth of knowledge that cannot be found anywhere else. Another good reason to shop with independents is that 68% of money spent locally is likely to stay in the local economy and retail, historically, has provided entry level jobs for our young people.

Wednesday July 4th 2012 has been selected as Independents' Day. The idea is to encourage people to walk around their own town and to take notice of the variety of shops and products that are available on their doorstep. Bideford & District Chamber of Commerce is supporting this idea which is being promoted nationally by Skillsmart Retail, British Independent Retailers Association, Entertainment Retailers Assoc. and other trade organisations. To encourage people to explore their town, the Chamber is organising a Treasure Hunt which will involve identifying participating shops from clues located in the shops. Anyone who completes the task will be entered into a draw for prizes donated by local businesses which will include a £50 dinner at Lathwells Restaurant, £50 voucher to be spent in store at Sounds Interesting, and vouchers to be spent at Trio, La Maison, Craftihands, Blazeys and many more great prizes. The hope is that as many shoppers as possible will show their support by buying at least one item from an independent retailer in Bideford. Let's keep our town centre alive and Celebrate our independents!

The small office at the back of the shop is a focus of local sensibility and intelligence and one wonders sometimes how Mr Harper manages to get all his office work done.'

Food for body and mind

I was talking to an ex Mayor the other day or, truth be known, she was telling me to "think positively". O.K. she was reprimanding me but she was right, we do have good quality

independent shops in Bideford, I wish I could remember the list she gave me. However, our basic problem is that over the past forty years we have lost the art of shopping and we have been brainwashed into thinking everything must come from a supermarket. If it doesn't have a supermarket label it is considered inedible, undrinkable, or unwearable. We used to choose particular shops for particular items be they food, drink or clothing. Before decimalisation prices crept up by a farthing, now, if you are lucky, prices go up by one new penny which is over nine times as fast, making it even more important to shop economically.

Food for the body is provided locally by some twenty cafés, restaurants and pasty shops, all of whom are independent. Cuisine ranges from the humble, but delicious fish and chips to exotic dishes from the orient. Independent butchers, bakers and greengrocers vie for business and in Mill Street the delicatessen offers a good range of local specialities - their lemon-curd is delicious!



Food for the mind is offered by good independent bookshops in the High Street, Allhalland Street and Mill Street, not forgetting the Pannier Market on Tuesdays and Saturdays. Their love of subject and literary knowledge is almost overwhelming, those less knowledgeable should take full advantage of their helpfulness. Rather than showing one's ignorance at the head of a long queue in a large book shop; we have all done it.

Of course, I moan the lack of a men's clothing shop, but the ladies are more than adequately supplied which shows nothing has changed and women still hold the purse strings.

However, it seems the quality of women's clothing in Bideford is improving. My informant also tells me that no woman wants to wear what can be immediately identified as coming from a 'chain', they all want to be slightly different which is part of their charm. I too am pleased to see the lightly built flats in fashion as they are so much more flattering than the 'Doc Martins' my staff persisted in wearing even under their ball gowns, true! Fortunately one can buy repairable shoes in Bideford, mine have been repaired twice and been worn almost every day since (one moment while I take one off to see) ah yes, first of August 2005. I always write the date in



the inner lining, if they don't last I go back and complain. I bought a pair of all leather brogues shoes in 1951 for £4.10 shillings (£4.50 pence) I saw a similar pair in Barnstaple the other day for £240; that I don't recommend. However, even if they cost fifty pounds it is better to buy ones locally that can be repaired, rather than cheap offers from far distant suppliers, which fall apart in a few months.

Finally the home makers amongst us are more than adequately supplied by local furniture, carpet, accessory and antique shops. Good independent individualistic shops where one can express one's individuality in the home. Finally, when you have counted all the pennies you have saved, you can blow most, if not all, in the local independent jewellery shops. Then, after settling down, write a note or card to your relatives bought from yet another local independent telling them how clever you have been with your shopping and how glad you are to be living in Bideford and not the ghastly conglomeration where they are!


own grandfather was her captain from 1887 to 1898 - the ship is given as his "Usual Residence" when he married in 1889.

The Liverpool & Cornwall Steamship Company's passenger and freight S.S. 'Hebridean' makes her first

sailing from Liverpool on Saturday next for Bideford The 'Hebridean' will leave Liverpool each Saturday until the end of August, and every night on a W



ednesday from Ilfracombe or Bideford. Under ordinary circumstances she will take about 24 hours to come down, and will be on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in Bideford, possibly making day trips when convenient before her return. The 'Hebridean' is a handsome, up to date boat, and is registered for 312 passengers. The opportunity of making sea trips to and from Bideford under ideal conditions is one that will doubtless be appreciated, and should bring some new visitors into North Devon.

BIDEFORD GAZETTE. 18th July 1911.

The S.S. 'Hebridean', referred to in our last week's issue, was the subject of much interest while lying at Bideford Quay yesterday. Visitors and residents will be afforded the opportunity of taking a cruise of the Bideford Bay in the 'Hebridean' on Tuesday evening July 25th, and a day trip to Lundy (allowing six or seven hours on the island) on Wednesday July 26th.

BIDEFORD GAZETTE. 29th August 1911.

The S.S. 'Hebridean' will make her last trip of the season to Lundy to-morrow, leaving Bideford Quay at 9 a.m.

A day in the life of a play worker.

Tuesday morning: out of bed, shower, breakfast, check my bag for the things I need for the day, walk up the road and wait for the bus. Off to play (I mean work!). Young Parents' Group this morning at The Wings Hall in Bideford, working 9.15 till 12.15.

I arrive early and meet my colleagues. We get the hall ready, setting up adults areas (where they can enjoy a cuppa/toast and a chat with their peers/staff/professional people) Sofas by the baby area to sit, relax and chat with other parents and their babies, age related toys and activities for the children and a baby area (for the parents to play and interact with their children). I myself love the creative/craft/messy activities and set about getting this ready. I cannot wait to get involved with the children in exploring, creating and having fun. We are not concerned about an end product here, it's all about the experience of allowing children to express themselves. We use gloop, play dough, paint, paper, glue, glitter, pasta, rice, sand, junk modelling, to name but a few. I will always advise the parents to dress the children in non-trendy clothes, but assure them the paint will wash out.

I like to get down on the floor and interact with the children, talking to them, encouraging them to enjoy their play and the experience (whilst also encouraging and reassuring the parents of the need to do this with their children because it's all part of how they learn). I help the children to learn about sharing the toys and suggest taking turns, trying to avoid disputes over who has the car now! Providing a push on the ride-on toys, a lift on or off the seesaw; keeping a watchful eye to avoid any incidents/accidents. Often parents will be involved in courses or cooking so their children are then left in my (the staff) care.

Time goes quickly and soon we start to pack up, we sit and sing some songs and rhymes, the parents leave and the staff put everything away. We then talk and evaluate the session, and plan for next week's activities.

Bus home, have some lunch and a cuppa, change of clothes if needed, then wait for my colleague to pick me up at 2.30 to go to another session this afternoon. SPARC:- (Single Parents Alone Raising Children) at the Children's Centre in Victoria Park. Because I have already looked at the planning sheet, I start to put together the activities for this session. Again I tend to deal with the craft table. Recently we have been doing some gardening: planting seeds, growing them in a greenhouse, then planting them out in the garden (the children love this, as do I!). We like to make the most of being outside. We have our tea together, which has been prepared for us but often we have to cut up our own fruit. We all sit together as eating a meal together is an important social gathering. Then we all muck in to do the dishes and tidy up. One or two staff members take the children back to the playroom and the third staff member sits with the parents for a coffee, chat and some adult time. The parents then come back in to the play room and we sing some songs and rhymes. The last song is "Time to go home". We clear away the toys and activities from inside and outside, then go and evaluate the session and confirm next week's activities before we go home... Nice cuppa, feet up after an enjoyable day at play (I mean work!).

Ki Aikido – the Japanese Art of Not Fighting

Stressed out? According to Huw Collingbourne, Aikido may be the answer.

Try this experiment. Stand upright. Concentrate your thoughts on a spot at the top of your head. Now ask a friend to push gently at the centre of your chest. You will probably find that you immediately overbalance. Now relax and concentrate your thoughts at a point about two inches beneath your navel. Don't do anything else. Just put all your concentration at that point. Once again ask your friend to push gently at the centre of your chest. Feels very different, doesn't it!

To many people it seems almost magical that you can become more physically stable just by concentrating your thoughts in a particular way. It is, in fact, entirely natural. Concentrating upon the centre of your body, your 'one point', automatically makes you more relaxed, more stable and calmer.

I remember an occasion, many years ago, when I was a magazine editor in London. It was deadline day and the place was in turmoil. Page six had gone missing, someone had spilt ink on page seven, everything that could go wrong had gone wrong. The art editor suddenly turned to me and screamed: "How come you are so calm when everyone else is in a blind panic?"

"Oh," I said smoothly, "Last night I was attacked by four black belts. This nothing!"

And it was true. Practising Aikido had made it easy for me to remain cool under pressure. It had taught me techniques (what we term 'Ki Development') to help avoid stress and conflict, not just when practising Aikido but in daily life too. In fact, if I were to describe Aikido, I wouldn't say it is a 'fighting art'; I'd say it is the art of *not* fighting!

If you'd like to find out more about Aikido, why not give it a try? A few months ago we started a new Ki Aikido club that meets every Thursday in the Bucks Cross Village Hall, between 7:00 and 9:00. When Moon moves through Capricorn, emotions are not so heightened it's not a 'heavy' transit, I think, but it's a time when we do and think in a much more practical way than usual. So from this evening on (for the next 2.5 days approx) see ourselves sorting things and doing things with a well structured and down to earth reasoning, we are all one way or another sorting out obstacles for two and half day stint of Moon's passage through Capricorn our emotional selves are not so 'light' as we sometimes experience, generally.

North Devon Nature Improvement Area.

A few months ago it was announced that, in the face of intense competition, our local district comprising mainly the river Torridge catchment area was designated as one of a select group of Nature Improvement Areas. This designation attracts grant funding of £700,000 and releases up to three million from other sources, all to be devoted to delivering benefits like better water quality, flood prevention, improved access to the countryside, recreation, health benefits and of course tourism. These aims are to be delivered by joint working through the Biosphere Partnership and Devon Wildlife Trust and should result in extensive linking up of existing protected habitats and establishment of new wildlife friendly

Apparently we live in one of the least protected areas in the country, probably because North Devon's countryside was so unspoiled that no-one realised it needed protecting – until recently, when rapid modernisation and industrialisation of farming practices has suddenly put so much of it under threat from machinery and bulk transport vehicles that are too big for our roads.

The project however is not just about protecting and preserving; it is a practical project to put biodiversity enhancement back into the environment and deliver benefits to the whole community.

There is a web site, probably linked to the North Devon AONB and Biosphere Service web site – for those who understand such things – but meanwhile we, the public, are impatiently waiting to hear or read more about what we can expect to see on the ground as the project progresses.

There is plenty of scope for Nature Improvement in the valleys of the Torridge and its tributaries. the catchment of which extends from Dartmoor and Hartland to the Bideford Bay coast. There are a few County Wildlife Sites and many unconfirmed sites waiting to be assessed for their biodiversity value, but there are many more miles of beautiful meadows and woodland that have been sympathetically farmed or neglected up to now, but are at risk from the ever increasing financial pressures on farmers to employ more intensive methods to produce more food for little extra income. Perhaps this is where Stewardship schemes can provide incentives, better targeted through the new NIA initiative, to make it financially worth while for farmers to protect the natural environment and use traditional methods to enhance biodiversity and maintain Torridge-side's uniquely attractive landscape. Barry Parsons, Leader of Torridge District Council, has compared our hopes for the North Devon NIA

to the Noosa reserve in Queensland. He said Noosa is a wonderful tourist attraction and boost for the area which people come to visit from all over the world. Another person who knows Queensland says, "I think he is in cuckoo land. I have been to Noosa. It is wonderful but it is rivers winding through wet forests and opening up into lakes. The NIA is never going to be like that."



I say let's not be defeatist. There was a time when the Torridge valley did consist of wet forests; in fact some small parts of it still are much the same, although perhaps without the lakes. If we could return the valleys to nature and bring back the wild beavers to manage the rivers in their traditional manner, we could have natural dams and lakes which would filter and regulate the water flow. improve the fish stocks and reduce pollution and siltation in the estuary. At present, Natural England spends money on coppicing riverside woodland in places and clearing other areas for the sake of marshland plants. Beavers would do all that work free of charge and even eat up the brushwood that they cut down. You may think I'm in cuckoo land well it's a lovely place and I've been there for years in my mind!

Autism Matters

The North Devon Forum for Autism and Related Behaviours has this year celebrated its 20th year, during which time our membership has increased and now numbers over 450. contacted each time we send a newsletter by email and post to parent/carers and professionals. We do not have a subscription and rely on donations and grants. Autism is a condition which remains with a person for life, but with help, intervention and a lot of hard work, many of the anxieties which cause behavioural issues can be addressed. We organise social events for the whole family so that they do not miss out on activities which other families take for granted, and at these meetings parents meet, exchange information and friendships are made – also siblings meet up with others. Siblings often feel that when anxieties take over during an outing they take second place. We regularly have swimming sessions at Torridge Pool, Northam; and a regular Christmas event at Ewetopia, at the Big Sheep. We have over recent years visited the Milky Way (evening event), Exmoor Zoo, Splash and Butlins. Our next event is an outing on 7 June to Exmoor by coach, where we shall walk from Watersmeet to Lynmouth, use the Cliff Railway to Lynton, to explore the area. This has been made possible by funding from Exmoor National Park, and it gives our families a chance to chat whilst travelling on the coach. We also hold a coffee morning on the fourth Thursday of each Month (except December) at Roundswell Community Centre (next to Sainsburys), Barnstaple from 10.00am to Noon. We recently organised two days of talks by Ros Blackburn, a well-known speaker who herself has autism which was very informative to those who came. News from the Burton Art Gallery and Museum

With the weather the way it is, and could be the same into July, the Burton is the best dry place to be, and its exhibits can keep us occupied for many a happy hour. Pottery by Clive Bowen and Svend Bayer can be seen in all its variety of shapes and textures until 5th August. Both potters are internationally known, their work much sought after. They produce simple forms with bold decoration, Clive uses a coating of slip,

(wet, loose clay), while Svend produces textured pottery. Clive's favours earthenware, and Svend, stoneware, and both potters use woodfired kilns. Some of the exhibits will be for sale, and this is the first time these two premier potters have exhibited together, although they have been friends for over 40 years. Follow your visit to the exhibition with a visit to the Museum, and discover the plethera of pottery in the Ceramic Collection, with items dating back 300 years up to the present day. In the Shop, you can pick up the Burton's own 'Top Trumps' cards, their theme is that very Ceramic Collection! Well done, the Burton staff to think up that one.

E. Aubrey Hunt was one of Hubert Coop's friends in the early 1900s, and when the Gallery opened in 1951, Coop gave his entire collection of paintings by his contemporaries for the people of Bideford and far beyond, to enjoy. Hunt was born in Massachusetts in 1856, trained in the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris, travelled through Europe to London, and became an associate of Whistler.

The exhibition continues until 5th August, and is a rare opportunity to view the entire Hunt collection from the Burton archive.

Family History.

Moving on with our research could present problems insomuch that your ancestors become more elusive. If you cannot find someone's birth certificate, it might be worth ordering their death certificate first to see what it contains, especially if they died relatively recently. A death certificate tells you the age of the person and from 1969 the date and place of birth are shown. If the deceased was a married woman then her maiden name will be given also. You might even find previously unknown forenames that could assist with your search. Another method is to try looking under variant surnames, as spelling was not consistent through the ages. Use occupation or geographical clues to narrow down your search and add information where possible such as age or place of birth. Keep trying they will turn up one day!!
