Horse Chestnut tree. Commonly known as the Conker tree. (*Aesculus hippocastanum*)

This large deciduous tree is often planted as a feature in parks. It was introduced into the UK from the Balkans in the 1600s and therefore is not a native tree. Its large white flowers (affectionately known as candles) put on a spectacular display in the spring after its sticky buds open. There is also a pink flowering variety. Have you ever wondered why the buds are sticky? It is because many insects lay eggs on tree buds so their larvae can eat the new leaves as they grow and the Horse chestnut produces sticky buds to protect its new leaves. Any insects that land on the sticky buds will be immobilised. The autumn is when this tree is sought after by children collecting its glossy brown seeds, (conkers) which are encased in a prickly shell.

Although the conkers are poisonous if eaten by horses and humans, squirrels and badgers seem to be immune from the toxins. The flowers, leaves and seeds have many uses in the world of herbal medicine and in various forms they are used to treat varicose veins, haemorrhoids, diarrhoea, fever, enlarged prostate, eczema, menstrual pain, soft tissue swelling from bone fracture and sprains, coughs, arthritis, and joint pain. The bark has been used to treat malaria and dysentery. It is also used in Bach Flower Remedies.

DO NOT TRY AND MAKE ANY CONCOCTIONS YOURSELF. IT IS POISONOUS AND IF USED INCORRECTLY CAN MAKE YOU VERY ILL.

A well known feature of mature Horse chestnut trees is the way large branches sag down to the ground. A famous example is the tree on the north end of Bideford Quay which has a branch supported by a carved wooden hand. (made by John Butler) Two new threats to Horse chestnut trees are a leaf miner moth, whose larvae eats the leaves, and a disease known as bleeding canker. This disease is as serious as Dutch Elm disease and many affected trees will die or lose large limbs.

<u>Players' Rules of Engagement</u> <u>for the Noble Game of Conkers</u> (Formulated For The Bideford World Conker Championships):

(Formulated For The Bidelord World Conker Championships): 1. All entrants' ticket numbers shall be drawn at random to establish the

first round playing schedule.

2. Each player must use a conker chosen at random from a selection supplied by the organisers and laced by the organisers at the beginning of each game. No conker may be reused.

All Conkers and Laces are to be checked by the referee before the start of each game. Laces must not be knotted further or tampered with after checking.

4. The game will commence with a toss of a coin, the winner of the toss may elect to strike or receive.

5. A distance of no less than 8" or 20cm of lace must be between knuckle and nut.

6. Each player then takes three alternate strikes at the opponent's conker.

7. Each attempted strike must be clearly aimed at the nut, no deliberate mis-hits.

8. The game will be decided once one of the conkers is smashed.

9. A small piece of nut or skin remaining shall be judged out, it must be enough to mount an attack.

10. If both nuts smash at the same time then the match shall be replayed.

11. Any nut being knocked from the lace but not smashing may be rethreaded and the game continued.

12. A player causing a knotting of the laces (a snag) will be noted, three snags will lead to disqualification.

13. If a game lasts for more than five minutes then play will halt and the "5 minute rule" will come into effect. Each player will be allowed up to nine further strikes at their opponent's nut, again alternating three strikes each. If neither conker has been smashed at the end of the nine strikes then the player who strikes the nut the most times during this period will be judged the winner.


The referee's decision is final.

Wonky Conker

The "Helping Hand", which holds up the "Wonky Conker tree" near Kingsley Statue on Bideford Quay, very nearly didn't happen at all. Some years before its construction, it was decided to chop down the mature trees on the riverbank in order to facilitate the building of the new car park.

Many trees were sawn down on a Sunday before an outraged public became aware of the destruction. One brave fellow sat by the "Wonky Conker" to save it successfully from the chainsaws.

A few years later, Doug Jenkin of Torridge District Council telephoned me, explaining that the "Wonky Conker" was in need up some physical support. He asked me if I had any ideas.



After mulling things over, we came up with the idea of a hand thrusting

through the paving stones to support the large horizontal branch. This idea was eventually approved and I set to work.

I bought some large lengths of oak from Torridge Hardwoods in Littleham, and with help and advice from my friend Barry Hughes, I worked out how to undertake the project. Firstly, the branch was supported by a metal prop that had been set into the ground. I then constructed the sleeve around the prop. The next stage was to form the fingers from individual lengths of oak and bolt them all together. Finally, the fingers, palm and thumb of the hand were set into the sleeve.

The "Helping Hand" project was covered in the local press, including an illustration of what was proposed. At this stage, a lady called Mrs Mayhew contacted Torridge District Council to say that she would like to pay for its construction, in memory of her late husband Samuel. This is why the initials S.T.M. and dates 1914-2000 were carved into the cuff.

The "Helping Hand" has been supporting the "Wonky Conker" for ten years. It is well weathered and has become a much photographed landmark. I hope that it will continue to give pleasure to Bidefordians and visitors for years to come.

History Boards

Bideford's Torridge District Councillors, working with the Bideford 500 project, have come up with the idea of history boards, which have been installed at Chudleigh Fort in East-the-Water and by the Old Town Cemetery.Both boards contain beautifully presented graphics and display a short written and pictorial history of each site using old pictures, drawings and photos, as well as photos of modern-day battle re-enactments and local wildlife.

Danger On The Street! (It's not what you think...)

Self-defence is more about common sense than about fighting, says Huw Collingbourne.

It's a cold, frosty night, you are out in the dark, you see a shadowy form approaching along the icy pavement, you want to avoid danger - so what do you do? You spot a gap in the traffic and you rush across the road in order to avoid the approaching stranger.

But wait a minute. Just stop and work out what the real risks are here. As I explained last month, people's estimation of the risk of an unprovoked attack is often far greater than the *actual* risk. The Devon and Cornwall Police told me that the chances of such an attack in this area are 'miniscule' and that, in any case, most violent assaults occur among people who already know one another. Assaults very rarely result from an encounter with a stranger.

On the other hand, the risks of serious injury from a traffic accident or simply from falling over are much greater. In 2011 The Guardian newspaper published a table of mortality statistics in England and Wales. Its most recent figures show that in a single year there were 11,917 accidental deaths, of which 2,284 were due to traffic accidents and 3,593 were due to falls. In the same period, only 318 deaths resulted from assault. That means that, compared with assaults, there is about 38 times the risk of being killed in an accident and over 11 times the risk of suffering a fatal fall.

Now let's return to the scenario which I described at the outset. We know that unprovoked attacks are extremely rare, especially in North Devon. We also know that the risk of injury or death from traffic accidents and falls is much greater. So, the plain fact of the matter is that if you try to avoid meeting a stranger by rushing across a road in icy conditions, you are *increasing* rather than decreasing the risk.

As a martial arts teacher, one of the things I am frequently asked by new students is "Will this work on the street?" – by which they mean, "If I am attacked on the street, will these martial arts techniques be an effective means of defence?"

My usual answer is "In the unlikely event that you are attacked, run away, hand over your wallet, do anything you can to avoid getting into a fight." And I mean that. Contrary to popular belief, most people do not spend years of their lives learning a martial art on the off-chance that they will one day have the opportunity to use it against gangs of attackers down a dark alley. There are all sorts of other reasons for learning a martial art – to gain confidence and calmness, to get fit or just for the sheer beauty and excitement of the art. And arguably one of the most important self-defence skills which a martial arts student may learn is the art of falling – and doing so *safely*!



We achieved 2nd place in our class!


During the summer play days at the Children's Centre many children helped enjoy making the costume with their art work, hand and foot prints.


Our next venture is a Family Fun Fundraiser. October 6th, 2-4pm at Bideford Bay Children's Centre in Victoria Park.

Dorothy Rundle *Never Again.* The David Rundle Trust was set up in 2001 in memory of Dorothy's late husand David and gives help and support to the people of Rwanda.

It now supports 174 children in their education, many of whom are orphans. Pascal, an orphan from the genocide, obtained his Bachelor's Degree 2 years ago.

The Trust has built water tanks and pipelines enabling several thousand families to obtain clean water. Also 11 groups of women in the foothills of the Virunga mountains are now practising family planning and helping to support their families through craft cooperatives. These are projects set up by the Trust.

No holds are barred in her book *Never Again* as she describes the personal life and death struggles of Rwanda's people and her own heart rending -and often hilarious experiences whilst living and working in Rwanda for the last 12 years. Iris Simantel *Far from the East End.* Iris Simantel is no J.K.Rowling or PD .James but this Devon writer has had the kind of whirlwind success many would-be writers can be envious of. For the last five weeks this 74year-old Sidmouth grandmother has been on the Sunday Times Bestseller list. Her book *Far from the East End,* which chronicles her life as an evacuee in World War II, was taken on by Penguin when she won the Saga Life Story competition.

As the author of a book See You after the Duration about my own evacuee experiences in the United States I have made a point of reading every book on the subject and can say that I haven't read a better written, more transparent account of the trauma of wartime evacuation.

In these unvarnished pages we live alongside a human spirit struggling and triumphing over adversity. It is social history with a human face, revealing from personal experience the huge divide between British classes in the 1940s, powerfully reminding us of the often long-term effects evacuation had on many children and families particularly from the East End. Gripping me from start to finish, from the separation and suffering of the Blitz to the peace and welcome of Wales, this journey of a lonely girl, growing up,speaks to us all. Not a dull page, not many without remembered pain, at times enlivened by embarrassingly down-to-earth language and the resilience of cockney humour. Plus an unexpected twist at the end. And this is just the first sixteen years of her life! No wonder she won the Saga prize and is frantically busy on the next instalment of her life for which, she tells me, she has already been offered a further contract.. **Michael Henderson**

Alice Hoffman Skylight Confessions.

'Of all the needs a book has the chief need is that it be readable' said Anthony Trollope. Alice Hoffman's three part novel 'Skylight Confessions' passes the readability test (though not compellingly so, and her new England setting is pleasing, but the book stumbles when it comes to believability. Nevertheless Part I could well have stood alone as a touching and guirky novella. Parts two and three are more fragmented with a ghost who seems to be visible to all and sundry, a seriously dysfunctional teenager and a slightly less dysfunctional young woman who becomes in the most ridiculous fashion his minder. Tolstoy spoke of 'artificiality of situation; one sees the intention and is put off; one feels the absurdity of the thing. ' These remarks are so apt to some of the scenes in 'Skylight Confessions' . There is a proverb 'The fate of books depends on the understanding of those who read them'. Perhaps one shouldn't always expect believability but without it a book lacks depth and resonance. For this reason Alice Hoffman has entertained her readers rather than deeply moving them. **Val** (from Bideford Library Readers' Group) Meets October 3rd 2.30pm at Bideford Library.



Reeds Cafe and Squire and Sons

Further to September's BUZZ WORD re Reeds Cafe, as a member of the Reed Family I can give you more information!

Albert Reed was the son of Alfred (my great-uncle) and Esther Reed who owned the Baker's Shop at No 12, Bude Street, Appledore. Albert's wife, Flossie, was Florence Penhorwood of Diddywell. My parents, Percy and Irene Reed, met whilst working at the Appledore Bakery and Shop, back in the 1920s. If you visit Bude Street today, you will see that the step of No 12 still bears the name REED with the original green tiles beneath the 'shop' window. Like father, like son? The steps have had the names REED for as long as I can remember. My guess is that they were engraved back in the 1930s.

I respond to your query in last month's Buzz as to the origins of Squire and Son, who once occupied 12 High St, now Walter Henry's Bookshop. Truscotts name also appears in the mosaic at the shop entrance.. Squire and Sons can be traced back to the Bideford Gazette as early as 1908. They were ' Silversmiths, Jewellers and Opticians' The firm promoted themselves as 'the leading jewellers in North Devon.'

In 1922 they sold the business to GF Truscott of Market Place Sidmouth who then traded in both towns. In March 1922 Truscotts advised that they had acquired Squire and Son, but had not taken on the stock. In a large advert in the Bideford Gazette they advised that extensive structural alterations would take place, and electric lighting installed.

Above Walter Henry's shop is a smallish sign advertising their premises which hangs from a very heavy wrought iron bracket. Originally there was an an illuminated box sign which as opticians depicted an eye hanging from there which needed strong support. The Truscott business continued as far as I can recall into the 1970s, possibly under new owners who retained the name. **Basil Pidgeon** *Bideford and District Community Archive.*

My sister and I were entered for a carnival as 'The Vicar and his Bride,' The Rev Hugh Muller had married a Helen Hinks, possibly

that year. Anyway, we innocent girls (probably under 10 years of age and no idea of the significance!) were dressed for the part . I was the 'vicar' and my sister Enid was the 'bride' and one of us had a card saying 'THE VICAR AND HIS BRIDE.'

A member of the public obviously objected as he snatched the board from us! I believe I hit him with the black umbrella I was carrying! (The Rev always carried a black umbrella). FISH SMELLED SWEET Rev. Hugh Muller, vicar of the English village of Appledore, had noticed that at harvest feativals people "were inclined to sit a long way from the fish display, obviously to avoid the smell." So this season he had the fish aprayed. He, noted that people crowded up close to the saimon and enjoyed "guite a different odor." Cats, on the other hand, were less attracted with Eau de Cologne.
