News from the Burton Art Gallery & Museum

The Westward Ho! & Bideford Art Society, formed in 1922, is holding its 89th Annual Exhibition now, and, as always, you will find a grand selection of art works, including paintings in all media, ceramics, textiles, and sculpture. The Society has maintained its high standards throughout those years, and its members come from the entire South West, so keen are they to exhibit, not only in this exhibition, but also in our unique and prestigious Burton Gallery. The

exhibition begins on **Saturday**, 6th **August**, and continues until 4th **September**. Entry is free, but you may wish to buy a catalogue when you are pondering over a purchase, perhaps? On the opening day, 6th August, Colin Allbrook, Society member and well-known watercolour artist and professional illustrator, will give us a free 'Talk and Tour' of the exhibition, enabling us to appreciate more fully the techniques and styles of the various artists whose work is on show.

Robert Race's Automata will still be on show until the 8th August. His work covers a wide range of moving toys for children and adults, using natural and re-used materials, such as driftwood. So simple, but fascinating, to see the way he puts the parts together.

August is a quiet month for adult's activities, but it could be a time to bring your holiday visitors, and enjoy the exhibitions, the Museum and the amazing Ceramic Collection. The latter has an interactive video screen, and a children's area where they can draw and explore, all the while learning about pottery, how it's made and decorated. The Craft Gallery is full of beautiful, hand-made artworks, - scarves, jewellery, ceramics, prints, wood carvings – ideal as gifts, - or just treat yourself! The Shop and Restaurant will keep you within the Gallery walls a little longer, too. Rolle Canal walk at Rosemoor.

Once again The Royal Horticultural Society have opened up their riverside woodlands as a special favour to allow the canal society to lead a walk down to the weir at the head of the Rolle Canal by the old Healand Docks upstream of Rosemoor Gardens.

In a walk of about two miles there is the opportunity to see the weir and mill leat as well as the riverside meadows and the ruins of the great lime kilns which the Rolle Canal was built to supply with coal and limestone shipped in via Bideford from Wales. (See Book News on page 14)

The walk starts at 2:30pm on Sunday 14th August, meeting at the far side of Rosemoor's woodland car park. All are welcome, subject to a contribution of £2 towards the Rolle Canal Society's works, but

sorry, no dogs are allowed on Rosemoor property. The paths are rough in places and there may be some muddy areas if wet, but good walking boots should be adequate.

The rangers will be at the meeting place whatever the weather. Children should be supervised by an adult.

Fly tipping

At the Appledore end of the Burrows, located where the old recycling centre used to be, Shawn, the warden, found a huge pile of grass cuttings almost certainly dumped by someone who had driven there with a trailer. When Shawn arrived, some horses were already helping themselves to the fresh cuttings. He said, "The problem is that when horses, sheep or cattle see such a feast laid out before them, they tend to gorge themselves. When this happens, it can create a build-up of gas in the stomach causing a condition known as bloat which if not treated will cause the animal's death."

Fly tipping is illegal of course, especially on the Burrows which is a Site of Special Scientific Interest and falls under the Countryside and Wildlife Act. Grass cuttings like this can contain seeds which can then geminate, introducing a foreign body onto the Burrows.

Shawn said, "It's possible that the person who dumped the heap of grass cuttings thought it couldn't harm the animals, but I can assure them it can. A pile like this can also interfere with the natural flora and fauna found on the Burrows so I would urge people to use their green wheelie bins for their garden waste, or take their grass cuttings to the nearest recycling centre." Torridge's Enviro-Crime officers will be stepping up patrols around the Burrows. And they are actively investigating a similar incident of grass cuttings in Scratchyface Lane in Bideford.

Devon GP: "Dementia – let's talk about it"

Dr Nick Cartmell, a GP from Ashburton Surgery who leads on dementia awareness in Devon, urged people not to be afraid of talking about dementia.

It comes as GPs in Devon are receiving additional help to spot the signs of dementia in their patients, as part of a programme which also means they spend more time talking about dementia with their patients.

The programme is being rolled out to all 107 GP practices across the county. It is based on developing a 'Map of Medicine' system which keeps GPs up-to-date with the latest information on dementia and helps support the improvement of services.

"Dementia can too often be hidden or feared, the word hardly uttered in public, like cancer was a few decades ago," he said.

"But I want people to talk about it as they do of cancer now. Cancer is out there in the open with massive public fundraising support, major advances in treatments, and everyone understands the need for diagnosis as early as possible.

"If we can achieve that for dementia then all of our futures, as we live longer, will be so much better.

"So let's talk about it and talk to people who help care for people with it. Dementia touches so many of us and if we all do a little bit the benefit will be enormous."

Minister for Older people

A nationwide campaign to petition the British government to appoint a Minister for Older People has been launched by Anchor, providers of retirement *housing* and care *homes* across the UK.

Despite making up 40% of voters, there is currently no government minister representing older people. As it stands, older peoples' issues are spread across various government departments. Anchor believe that what is really needed is a single minister to prioritise the needs of older people, making sure that their views and interests receive the attention they deserve. 

Mary Boleyn is remembered by posterity as a 'great and infamous whore'. She was the mistress of two kings, Francois I of France and Henry VIII of England, and sister to Anne Boleyn, Henry VIII's second wife. She may secretly have borne Henry a child and it was because of his adultery with Mary that his marriage to

Anne was annulled. It is not hard to see how this tangled web of relationships has given rise to rumours and misconceptions that have been embroidered over the centuries.

In her new book, the first full-scale biography of Mary Boleyn, Alison Weir explodes much of the mythology that surrounds her subject and uncovers the facts about one of the most misunderstood figures of the Tudor age. Her extensive, forensic research has facilitated a new and detailed portrayal, in which she recounts that, contrary to popular belief, Mary was entirely undeserving of her posthumous notoriety as a great whore or the 'hackney' whom the King of France famously boasted of riding. Alison Weir also presents compelling new evidence that almost conclusively determines the paternity of Mary's two oldest children. This astonishing and riveting book shows that Mary's story had a happy ending and that she was by far the luckiest of the Boleyns.


Mind the hot embers!

Tarka Trail



A new leaflet encourages walkers to venture further on to the Tarka Trail

It promotes 11, easy to follow way-marked walking loops from the Trail's walking sections that take people off the beaten track into stunning, wildlife rich landscapes and into remote villages and hamlets that to many are the 'real Devon'.

Most people are familiar with and consider the Tarka Trail to be the 30 mile shared use footpath and cycle way that runs between Braunton and Meeth. The Tarka Trail is actually a 180 mile figure of eight route and the shared use section is only part of it. Over most of its length, the Tarka Trail follows Rights of Way and quiet roads through coastal and upland landscapes made famous by the Otters journeys in Henry Williamson's iconic 1927 novel, 'Tarka the Otter'.

The leaflet is available from libraries, Tourist Information Centres, direct from the County Council and through other leisure outlets and was put together by the North Devon Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and Biosphere Service with the help of local walkers.

Here are a couple of the new CDs and DVDs we have this month, that you might like to have a listen to/look at...

Never let me go (DVD)

A stark and almost unemotional look at how life (and death) could have been. That said, it is really a love story of three children, brought up together in a boarding school, who become tangled up in a love triangle and then discover they are clones, bred to be organ donors when they grow to be adults. The book by Kazuo Ishiguro is amazing, and the film stunning. Will either leave you totally uninvolved (unlikely), or shedding bucket loads of tears.

Brighton Rock (DVD)

A brave decision, to embark on a re-make of this classic 50s film and there are some differing reviews about. Some love it, some hate it and prefer the original. But the original is dated, and this version brings everything up to date. Give it a try and make up your own mind. The fact that it has Helen Mirren and John Hurt in it, as well as newcomer Sam Riley, should make it an entertaining experience.

Imagined Village – Empire and Love (CD)

Following on from their recent debut album, this one is more about having fun with their folksy music. I am told that they are fantastic live, so catch them if you can, but do listen to this CD. It is excellent.

Majestic Silver Strings – Buddy Miller (CD)

A mix of traditional country, blues and folk performed by a "super-group" of guitarists, Bill Fresell, Marc Ribot, Greg Leisz abd Buddy Miller. They play with much enjoyment, and you can hear it in the mix of slide, steel and acoustic strings. Hence the name. Truly majestic!

Book News

'Fragrant Harbour' by John Lanchester (Read and discussed by Bideford Library Readers' Group)

Fragrant Harbour, (Xian gung in Cantonese) or Hong Kong to bankers and tourists alike, is a miniature epic presented as four novellas by John Lancaster, the reputed journalist and award winning author who spent his childhood there. His descriptions evoke a sense of the exotic Far East but the reality is something of a paradox. Such a paradox is central to the novel.



We first meet an annoying columnist, Dawn Stone, who capitalizes on a 'lucky break' to work for a Hong Kong magazine. This provides her financial and social advancement in a society to which she shows general disinterest. Her journey to Hong Kong also coincidentally introduces the character of Matthew Ho, an entrepreneur, who represents the rise of 1990s globalization. Stone and Ho depart from their career paths and through a plot twist end up acting as 'gatekeeper' and 'banker' for a Triad empire.

A more considered character, Tom Stewart, is introduced in the second much longer novella. He is a Kentish lad who leaves a successful public house and becomes a successful hotelier. As a young man his naïveté is reflected in choices he makes on the outward voyage particularly in his capitulation to a wager which requires him to become fluent in Cantonese. His success owes much to a Chinese-born nun, fellow passenger and future life-long friend and allows him to merge with his new environment. There more to this relationship than we are told. Frustratingly, the rectitude of Sister Maria provided only glimpses of a fully intimate relationship. Her language skills would later end her life and bury the truth with her in Hong Kong harbour.

How will the past and the future be reconciled? Lanchester provides no answers, only observations.. Does this book justify the designation, epic? It is hardly 'Crime and Punishment' nevertheless Lanchester provides an agreeable read. Understanding Lanchester's themes is helped by investigating the history of Hong Kong. Praise be for the personal knowledge of the Bideford Reading Group and for the Internet! For the travellers in the Bideford Reading Group, we enjoyed an exquisite prose poem of Hong Kong, an opportunity to admire photos and an excuse for a trip to 'East the Water' Chinese Restaurant.

Vernon Boyle, Barry Hughes, and the Rolle Canal

In his book, *Rolle Canal and the North Devon Limestone Trade*, Barry Hughes describes the ships in the limestone trade, which gave work to the particular type of vessel known as the Polacca Brig. The late Vernon Boyle wrote a detailed picture of these interesting ships in *Mariner's Mirror*. Barry Hughes pays tribute to Boyle and his pioneering work, which ultimately led to the establishment of the North Devon Maritime Museum.
