

#### **Bideford Hospital 1962**

My father had a chemist's shop in the High Street and I married a local girl just before my final exams. From a London teaching hospital to Bideford Hospital was a steep learning curve for me as a junior hospital doctor, just registered! to be the sole senior house officer in residence. My wife and I lived in a two roomed flat above the casualty department with our baby son and our meals were cooked and brought up to us from the hospital kitchen each day. I was expected to be 'on call' except for one half day a week, (which ended at midnight) and the local



GPs were on hand for help and advice. Mr. Stirk and Dr Hewetson did the major surgery and I was their assistant while Dr Shaw and Dr Hunt did most of the anaesthetics. Consultants for Exeter came regularly - Mr Capener for orthopaedics and Dr Brimblecombe for paediatrics, visiting the tiny children's ward next to our flat. Dr King and Dr Smart (of Marwood Garden's fame) were the physicians.

It would be true to say I became a better doctor in the next few months as casualty officer as well as my other duties. We had a patient with an adder bite and sent for anti venom from Exeter. I didn't know how to give it, but happily one of the staff nurses had worked in India and told me how to inject it into the abdominal wall muscles. Another patient arrived one evening asking to have his ears syringed. I said I thought he should be going to his doctor as it was hardly an emergency. 'I'm the catcher of the the trapeze artist in the local circus' he said. I syringed his ears.

We used the stomach pump for overdoses, always a hairy moment, but I do recall someone from the shipyard at Appledore when the casualty floor was awash with cider. He must have drunk about a gallon! We also had a smallpox scare that year when there was a big catch up with vaccinations rather like the recent measles epidemic,

I left to work in Obstetrics and Gynaecology prior to finding a general practice in Sussex and have only returned to our roots in the past eleven years but Bideford has always been where we wanted to be. **Michael M Wilks M.B. MRCS. LRCP.D.Obt; MRCGP.** 

### **Bideford Hospital 1940**

I spent some time in Bideford Hospital as a child.I lived in Orpington, Kent and suffered frequent sore throats so my Doctor thought I should have my tonsils out .As the 2nd World War had started my parents did not want me to be in hospital there and arranged for me to come to Bideford where some relatives had already moved.

I was about 7 years old and remember vividly my confusion and embarrassment being carried to the operating theatre with the back of the gown being apart and my posterior being visible to the other children! I didn't much like having my hands held down when the anaesthetic was given either. Afterwards I was given thin bread and butter slices - with the crusts cut off! It was disappointing to find subsequent ones had the crusts on!

I was longing to get out of bed and play with the rocking horse and doll's house although I don't remember doing so.

The girl in the next bed - the end one- had doctors to see her without at first drawing the curtains and I was fascinated to see that she had all sorts of tubes coming out of her. When they saw me looking they pulled the curtain and I could see no more, I often wondered what she had wrong. My aunt by marriage, Phyllis Prentice, was a ward sister at Bideford hospital for some time before she became Sister Tutor before retiring. In her retirement she spent about a year as a patient- in the new buildings and did her best to keep the nurses on their toes!

This year will be the 91st year of the annual exhibition. It runs from the 27th July – 30th August and regularly features over 300 works of art, including painting, sculpture, textiles, printmaking, ceramics and more. A talk and tour lead by members of the society will introduce the exhibition at 2pm on the 27th July, free, all welcome.Handing in dates are **Friday 19th July 2 - 4pm and Saturday 20th 10 -11am**. As many of you will remember, late last year the Burton was awarded an £8700 funding bid from the Heritage Lottery Fund All Our Stories programme to explore the heritage of Bideford Black. "We've been amazed by how many people and how much information has come forward, in fact the hardest part of the project has been knowing where to stop. # Memories of St Peter's Church East the Water

This church was consecrated on Saturday June 28th 1890 by the Bishop of Exeter. The cost of the site and building, over £2000, was defrayed by the then Rector of Bideford, the Rev. Roger Granville.At the conclusion of the service, a public luncheon was served at the Royal Hotel, and then the new cemetery at East the water was consecrated. One of the greatest benefactors of the new church was Mr.C Strachan Carnegie of Clevelands Northam



(cousin of Andrew Carnegie who endowed Bideford Llbrary, and who opened the new library in 1906) The stone from the building was obtained from a quarry at Cornborough and was built by Mr Glover of Abbotsham. The church was built on the site of an allotment and a tollgate.

As the years passed the town of Bideford grew in size and the church was no longer able to accommodate them, and a larger meeting place was needed.

Sadly for numerous reasons St Peter's Church has not been in use for some time and now the sale of the building has been completed. Many people will have very happy memories of their church at East the water.

# Tarka Child Contact Centre Celebrates its 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

June saw the 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of a local charity...the Tarka Child Contact Centre (TCCC). The members of the charity celebrated this milestone at the recent Volunteer Recognition Night, which was organised by Torridge District Council and TTVS, at the Pier House, Westward Ho! As an Accredited member of the National Association of Child Contact Centres, TCCC registered for their long service awards and the Northam Mayor, Barry Mason, presented some of the volunteers with NACCC silver awards for 5 years volunteering with the charity.

TCCC offers Supported Contact in order for children, aged birth to 16 years, to spend time with their absent parent, and often other family members, when there is no other viable option; thus ensuring that children continue to have a relationship with both of their parents.

TCCC opens on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> weekends of the month and rents the Bideford Bay Children's Centre, which offers excellent facilities for play, to hold the contact sessions. The Centre aims to provide a safe, impartial and friendly environment in which children can continue their relationship with their absent parent whilst just playing and having fun! Nationally, there are more than 350 Child Contact Centres, who acknowledge the need for parents to be supported and encouraged in order to rebuild trust and communication and ultimately progress towards making their own contact arrangements.

Since opening, the charity has made many changes and improvements to the service that it offers:

- Increasing from the original Saturday session to offering an additional Sunday session, thus offering 48 sessions per year, instead of the original 28.
- In response to the recent restrictions on the availability of Legal Aid, the Centre now accepts Self-Referrals, making the service more accessible.
- Due to the recent closure of a Child Contact Centre in Barnstaple, TCCC is now the only centre accommodating referrals from the North Devon and Torridge area

The Centre is operated by a team of well trained volunteers and relies entirely on fundraising, donations and grants in order to continue to offer this service free of charge.

# News from Bideford Library Readers' Group

Remarkable Creatures by Tracy Chevalier.

This book was unusual in more ways than one. Firstly, it gained (almost) universal approval from everyone at the meeting: this in itself is a rare occurrence! Secondly, it was the sort of book that you could put down (it certainly wasn't a thriller where you might feel you had to keep reading) yet once put down, you couldn't wait to pick it up again!



The story is about Mary Anning, the 'greatest fossil hunter in the world', and her friend Elizabeth Philpott. Both characters really existed, living in early 19th Century Lyme Regis. Mary Anning's life is documented at the Natural History Museum but this novel 'fills in the gaps' imaginatively. The mix of fact and fiction makes for thought stimulating reading.

Tracy Chevalier's writing evokes a strong sense of time and of place – the group are now contemplating a visit to Lyme Regis, which also features in Persuasion by Jane Austen -the story has echoes of that author, being set in a similar time period.

Events in the novel give a flavour of how class divisions might have operated at the time and the barriers this created. Elizabeth and Mary were unusual in being able to by-pass their class divisions but few other characters in the story were able to do the same. The story also drew out the hugely differing roles of males and females during this time. Chevalier's accessible style of writing showed the two females as strong characters whilst the males were rarely portrayed in a positive light. There was a sense of how difficult it was for females to operate in the world of science at the time. Some might say that this is still an issue today!

Despite almost universal approval of this story – or perhaps because of it – this was one of the longest discussions the group has had. It led to an exchange of opinions on the roles of males and female, then and now, on how the world might have been, family loyalties and on endangered species/extinction. Few of us in the group knew much about fossils and were thankful to John Martin for answering many of our questions on the topic. **Peter Evans**

## **Huguenots in Bideford**

As a descendant of Huguenots by marriage, I was fascinated to learn from the very useful Heritage trail by David Howell that many of them settled in Bideford when they fled from France in 1685. Many were skilled weavers who settled in the town and developed the silk and cotton trade. The French Huguenot chapel was in Chapel Lane (off Allhalland Street) and it is possible that Samuel Pepys worshipped there because his wife Elizabeth came from a Huguenot family in Bideford. 'Elizabeth was born in Devon, in the neighbourhood of Bideford where her parents had settled. She was the daughter of Alexander St Michel an exiled Huguenot, and a penniless bride of fifteen years.' (from the introduction to The diary of Samuel Pepys, Macmillan edition 1905) There is also a little book by Inkermann Rogers, 'Huguenots in Devonshire, ' (used to be at Bideford Library ), but which is now available for reference. at Barnstaple Local studies which lists many Huguenot names associated with Devon, including Arno. So perhaps I can very loosely claim to have had connections with Bideford since the 17th century! **RA** 

# Crossing the Torridge – 11 Bridges between Bideford and Torrington!


It's surprising how they add up once you set out to count the bridges.!

The oldest of course were the pack-horse bridges dating from around the 12<sup>th</sup> century of which there were three, Bideford, Rothern and Taddiport. All these show clear evidence of various widening works over the centuries to enable initially carts and carriages and eventually motor vehicles to cross, although still supported on the original stone piers except in the case of Bideford Long Bridge where it is believed that an original timber structure is embedded within the more

recent, 13<sup>th</sup> century, masonry arches. No new bridges were built until the Aqueduct was constructed to carry the Rolle canal across the valley in 1827 but this was quickly followed by Halfpenny Bridge connecting Weare Giffard with the new Turnpike road in the 1830s. (No prizes for guessing the amount of the toll charged for crossing the river).

The coming of the railway in the 1870s entailed a further four bridges to carry it in a fairly straight line up the valley and, while the first of these, at Landcross, is a basic iron girder construction, the three near to Lord Rolle's residence at Beam Mansion are made up of handsome stone built arches illustrating the power of the aristocracy to preserve the beauty of the landscape.

Rothern Bridge at Staple Vale, having stood alone for some five centuries, was now joined by a spectacular wooden viaduct to carry the Marland Light Railway across the valley,



bringing in clay from the Peters Marland clay pits for transshipment to the main line railway to Bideford. This was in turn replaced by another iron girder viaduct similar to that at Landcross when the mineral line was upgraded to standard gauge and extended to Halwill Junction.

The last new bridge was built in the mid 20<sup>th</sup> century, in between Rothern Bridge and the railway viaduct, to relieve the old turnpike bridge from all he fast and heavy traffic of the new, enlarged main road, the A386. This leaves Taddiport Bridge as the last of the original three pack horse bridges to remain of single track width and yet carrying a significant classified road linking Torrington with the country to the west.

#### **Guided Walk**

There is a guided walk scheduled for July 21st which takes in the history of the road, railway and canal at Staple Vale and the canal route north to Beam House where new steps have been installed linking it to the Tarka Trail. This is part of the Heritage Lottery funded "Life's Journey" project to enhance access and interpretation of the Rolle Canal along the Tarka Trail and the walk is organised by the Rolle Canal Society who will appreciate a contribution of £2 per person towards their on-going volunteering work on the canal and its associated heritage. The walk is only about a couple of miles, starting from the Puffing Billy (Old Torrington Station) at 2:30pm on Sunday July 21st.and is open to all comers. ### Jack the Giant Slayer

I was exceptionally pleased to have been asked by Bideford Film Society to review the film 'Jack the Giant Slayer' because it is my favourite film so far this year. It had the excitement and the adventure which had me on the edge of my seat throughout the whole film.

The story is about a young farmer called Jack (Nicholas Hoult) who accidentally starts a war between humans and the giants. As in the fairytale, Jack comes into possession of some magic beans. During a brief encounter with Princess Isabelle (Eleanor Tomlinson) at his farmhouse, he mistakenly drops one of the beans which rapidly grows into a massive beanstalk reaching high into the sky. The house, with Princess Isabelle still inside, is carried up where she becomes the prisoner of the giants in their kingdom in the clouds. Jack, who is in love with Princess Isabelle, is on a mission to save her!

Unlike the pantomime or traditional tale of Jack and the Beanstalk that might be read to young children at bedtime, this film would be more suitable for older children due to its frequent frightening and rather violent scenes.

#### Handy Cross Camp

I can assure MIKE SHEPPARD he's not delusional! (June Buzz) However it was a camp for refugees and displaced persons rather than POW's. My parents moved into the Grenville Estate when the prefabs were first assembled (no 40!) and our garden backed on to the hedge which bordered the camp,located behind Blights garage,and I often climbed through the hedge to talk to these men living in very basic huts. Some may remember a Franz Belak an Austrian who fled Yugoslavia when Mr Hitler's troops invaded that country. Franz was a great sportsman and played ice hockey and football and it was through football that Franz and my Father met and struck up a friendship which was to last for many years ( they played for Bideford AFC ). Franz eventually emigrated to Toronto where he met and married a B IDEFORD girl (small world!!) but we still kept in touch right up to Franz's death, which we knew about when receiving a letter from his widow containing a report from the newspaper on his life. Most of the men had gone from the camp by about the late forties or early fifties as i remember some of the GE residents organising a Coronation day party which we held in one of the now empty huts.

#### Help for Motor Neurone Disease

My younger brother Michael Morgan has Motor Neurone Disease. MND is a progressive disease that attacks the motor neurones, or nerves, in the brain and spinal cord. This means messages gradually stop reaching muscles, which leads to weakness and wasting. MND can affect how you walk, talk, eat, drink and breathe. There is no cure at the moment so we are looking for people or help to do some fundraising.

He was diagnosed at the beginning of 2010, at the age of 28. Over the past 3 years Michael's condition has deteriorated quite rapidly. Michael, his wife (who is also his full time carer) and his 2 small children have received much help & support from friends & family. Michael is now getting to the stage where he is need of an eye gaze computer system to help keep him as independent as possible, however these cost around £14,000! Eye gaze systems allow people with severe physical disabilities to access a computer. These systems have an inbuilt camera which tracks where your eyes are looking, enabling you to move the mouse pointer around. He can use also use it as a mobile, control the bed, his chair, the TV and many more things.

Jodie, Michael's wife, is trying to organise a sponsored walk from Bideford to Barnstaple on Sunday July 14th, with a start time of 10am; to help raise funds to go towards the Eye Gaze System.
