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

News from the Burton Art Gallery & Museum

April 2014 is rather special for the Burton Gallery. Gillian Ayres is one of the leading British abstract painters of her generation, and has created a 'bespoke' exhibition of her new works and woodcuts especially for us. We are her first venue; after 1st June, when it closes, the exhibition will speed on its way to London's Royal Academy. This is a rare privilege. Looking back on Gillian's career, she has exhibited in Oxford's Museum of Modern Art;



London's Serpentine Gallery; the Tate, the Royal Academy in 1997, and New York's Museum of Modern Art. She is also a teacher, having spent many years at St. Martin's School of Art in London, and has been shortlisted for the Turner Prize. She has the initials R.A. And O.B.E. after her name, You will find her work permanently in the V. & A. and the British Museum, so you can imagine that to have such a well respected artist creating an exhibition just for us in Bideford, is

something of a coup! *Exhibition dates:* 5<sup>th</sup> April to 1<sup>st</sup> June.

If you would like to be taken on a free 'Talk and Tour' of the exhibition, come to the Gallery on 5<sup>th</sup> April at 2.00 p.m. David Cleaton-Roberts, co-Director of the Alan Cristea Gallery, has worked closely with Gillian, and is a well-informed friend to take us on an informal tour of her work.

Coming down to earth, the Friends of the Burton are holding their Annual General Meeting on Saturday, 12<sup>th</sup> April, (in gallery 2) and after the routine business is done, Adrian Wills will give a talk on 'Devon's Forgotten Canal' - if you are not sure which one – have a guess. It's the Rolle Canal. which served between the Sea Lock and Town Mills at Torrington in the 19th century, bringing precious lime to our farmers. To learn more, come to the A.G.M. at the Gallery around 11.45; this is part of our local history, and was very important to its economy at the time. The Museum on the first floor of the Gallery, has a model of a lime kiln, built by Barry Hughes, who has also built a model of the inclined plane. All welcome, but become a Friend while you're there. ## **Book News**

Kisses on a postcard by Terence Frisby (discussed by Bideford Library Readers' Group)

Although this was not a literary masterpiece, most of the group enjoyed the book about London evacuees(vackies) transported to Cornwall at the outbreak of the Second World War. The title referred to the postcard to be sent back to their mother in London and was a sort of code. One kiss meant come and get me, 2 meant it was ok and 3 nice. From the beginning the experience was 'brilliant,' so they were amongst the lucky ones who were billeted with loving and caring foster parents, Auntie Rose and Uncle Jack (and incidentally they covered the postcard in kisses)

I had reservations about this book because I felt that while of no particular literary merit it had managed to be a very successful book. My view was that there were many books on the same subject

which didn't make the best seller list, or indeed were not published at all.

I also felt there was a slightly distorted view of country living. There was an assumption that the vackies had discovered the delights of the countryside all on their own and that the actual country dwellers were unaware of what was around them. However he does get some of his London cockiness knocked out of him by Uncle Jack.

Some members of the group felt the book was unnecessarily sadistic with descriptions of killings of wild animals. This would seem to come naturally to country people who needed, especially in wartime, to be self sufficient.

It was however in the main, a pleasant and nostalgic read, with some very sad moments, prompting at least an hour's concentrated discussion. **RA**

#### Memories of an evacuee.

With time on my hands, I have been trying to trace people who were part of my youth – over 70 years ago! Knowing only her maiden name, and not having seen or heard of her since the end of WW2, I spent several hours on the Internet before coming up with a possible match. I then wrote to a 'Mrs June Sims' who, as a child, could have been evacuated to Appledore with her parents, and billeted with us, having lost their home during the Plymouth Blitz.

About a week later I received a letter from June – yes, I had found her! Below is what she had to say about her time in North Devon which my sister Enid and I found fascinating

What a surprise your letter was - received the day after my 85<sup>th</sup> birthday. Yes I am the June Randle that was (now Sims). I remember Appledore well and your Mum, Dad and Enid with the blonde bob and you and your pigtails. Also remember the lovely smell of bread baking where your Dad worked, and Dulcie who lived in the big house opposite – we both caught the bus to Stella Maris Convent and often she brought me a lovely apple from her garden. Such happy memories and best school-days of my life (only 18 in class!!!), Greek dancing on the lawn. I was rather overwhelmed at first, having wanted to go to Edgehill College and being a Protestant – but the sisters were so kind and welcoming and, knowing we had been bombed out and lost our home in the Plymouth Blitz (being bombed every day and night – how did we stay alive?), they reduced my school fees!!! Also remember catching crabs on the guay with bacon rinds.

After 12 months my parents returned to Plymouth and I then lived with my dancing teacher and her parents Mr & Mrs Jordan who kept the New Inn at Instow.

Although worried about Mum and Dad going back to Plymouth, was well looked after and very happy, walking on the beach each day after school with Joan and the dog, gathering driftwood for the range – Mrs Jordan made the best chocolate sponge ever – I think the farmers visiting the pub helped her out with eggs etc. Also having stew with spaghetti and tomatoes to make it stretch I suppose, the things we remember. Mum also used to make pasties on a Tuesday and come and meet me and we used to go to the park and eat them. (Always hid my velour hat as we were not allowed to eat out of doors!!!)

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## A few thoughts on chewing gum.

According to shopkeepers people buy chewing gum for a variety of reasons. It freshens your breath (can therefore disguise the fact that you've been drinking or smoking), it's useful for people who are trying to give up alcohol or tobacco,

it, as the ads used to say 'helps you concentrate' and it has the advantage of having something in your mouth which isn't chocolate or another fattening substance, so it helps you to diet. All useful or laudable factors. I hadn't realised until recently (call me naïve) that the white marks all over the town are in fact discarded gum. I imagined that a colony of seagulls had been pretty busy leaving their droppings all over the 'little white town', no pun intended.

I couldn't understand why the new York paving stones in Cooper St had suddenly developed a mosaic pattern, not an attractive one, which had crept down to Jubilee Square But my main question is? When does this happen. To my knowledge I have never seen anyone disposing of chewing gum in the street. Even the roads have this white stuff, so is it thrown out of cars, or do people quietly drop it en route.

Don't get me wrong, I can appreciate the difficulties with the stuff. If you smoke, every bar and restaurant has a box outside for your fag ends, but there are no such arrangements for gum. I know from my own experience that rather than wreck the pocket of my coat, I have had to search around for a tissue to 'wrap it and bin it' and of course you don't always have a tissue or a bin. Far easier to surreptitiously drop it when no one's looking, or stick it in the exhaust pipe of the nearest car!

#### A few facts about chewing gum

This year, Easter is very late - Easter Sunday is 20th so there is plenty of time to plan some lovely Fish recipes for Good Friday and the Holiday. We will be cooking and tasting an interesting range at "Fish \$ Easter" dishes at

the cookery session at Bideford College on Thursday 3rd April 6.30-9.00. Please book and come along as this an opportunity to cook and taste and take a dish home for the family, thanks to support from the Petroc/FLAG "Tipping the

April. Here is a Jack Munro from the Waitrose Kitchen magazine. This recipe is cheap and healthy and uses the last of the wonderful root vegetables. She made it for herself and her son when she kept them both on £10.00 a week!

Fish with root vegetable Tagine -a Moroccan dish to make in a tagine, casserole dish or a large pan. To serve 4

White fish Pollack, Coley, Cod or Haddockfrozen local fish portions can be used

1tbsp vegetable oil I onion sliced

I small chilli-finely sliced

1 tsp. ground cumin, turmeric, paprika I potato, and I carrot peeled and cut into 2cm chunks(or any root vegetable available) Chicken or vegetable stock cube Lemon juice

1 400gm chopped tomatoes

1 205gm can or Mandarin oranges in fruit juice


I handful of parsley and mint leaves (chopped) Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large pan or heatproof casserole dish, add the onion, chilli and spices, cooking for 23 minutes until softened slightly.
- 2. Add the cubed potatoes and carrot, crumbled stock cube, stirring to combine.
- 3. Stir in the chopped tomatoes, mandarins in their juices and the lemon juice. Bring to the boil and gently simmer for about 15minutes, top up with water if required.
- 4. Add the large cubes of fish and simmer for 5 minutes. Check vegetables and fish is cooked 5. Take off the heat and stir through the chopped herbs, breaking up the fish slightly.

## The Yuletide Logs – 30 years on.

Now in his early sixties, the call for Yuletide logs fell upon him once again.

He'd seen the giant log earlier in the month while walking with a friend along a tidal river's companion footpath. The 'log' was almost a tree, on closer inspection it was old and dry, despite being touched by the occasional spring tide that would flow a few miles upstream. It was probably the river that once carried his tree to its resting place just yards down the stony banked slope of the long disused railway track, and separated from the main river by a hundred yards or so of salt marsh. The 'log' was probably thirty yards long and a good foot across at the thickest end; it had locked itself by thinner but usable branches into the estuary mud and under the shelter of a row of weather stunted track side trees that overhung the marsh.

Wood burner stoves had changed much in thirty years and were increasingly popular due to a steeply rising price in gas and electricity. A fuel shortage in the world seemed imminent. In North Devon a log shortage also seemed imminent according to regular log burning enthusiasts in the pub as they reported sparse finds on their forays into the wilderness. All the easy wood was gone, collected, cut, chopped and no doubt already burned by new owners of log burners, all fearing that the wood was running out, and of course the evidence was all around; previously 'rich in pickings' logging grounds were now only populated by the empty handed log hunters themselves.

for how long? It was a good mile away down the track from where his car could be parked. Christmas was coming and coming apace; the log must be saved from marauding Yuletide log snatchers. He must act.

He had lunch in the Royal Hotel, changed into old clothes in the car park, donned woolly hat and gloves, picked up the trusty bow saw and set off steadily westward on the winter frosted track.

It seemed to be further along than he remembered as his eyes scanned the tidal debris hiding under the bank and trees; fortunately the log's position was roughly land marked by a big white house across the river on the opposite bank and it was a relief to find his log still there.

Less nimble ... if he ever had been nimble ..... and so as not to slip with it in hand he threw the saw through the broken wire fence on to the salt-marsh below, then he carefully worked his body under the rusty but still stout British Rail fencing wires, his feet now with a will of their own sliding down the steep slope; he hung on to the wire with his hands; the whole process, to a casual observer,

resembling the activities of an inebriated orangutan in tramp's clothing; at last he obtained an upright posture, feet firmly settling into the salt marsh mud.

There she was, the log, the great log, half hidden under fresh tide delivered flotsam; he used his ageing strength and weight to roll the log for a convenient cut.

Convenient cut? The bow saw struggled to make any effect on the hard wood; even the low angle of cut had the tip of the saw driving into the estuary mud .. .... in good company with his boots and knees. He stopped several times to stand, rest and stare up and down the river as if doing so would materialise the chainsaw and trailer needed for this job. Neither appeared and thought alone wasn't going to cut the log so he struggled on slowly and cut twice so as to give him two good pieces and leave enough for three more another day. He dare not cut the remainder for fear of pillagers taking advantage ... no, it was best left in one big awkward lump, he covered the evidence with a little mud and few leaves and orang-utanged his way back up the slope and on to the track.

Now the mile trek with heavy burden back to the car.

About halfway he was stopped by an old lady out for a walk, she enquired of directions as to how she could return to the town by a different route. She was in no rush to ask, or to hear the answer, obviously the chap in front of her could stand there all day holding those logs on his shoulder. He gave her his best advice and continued the step by step struggle homewards. A dog came by, with a keen look at his logs. He'd The 'log', our log, ... his log, was so far safe, but noticed before that dogs, often out that way for a walk, were never put off by the size of the 'stick' a man might carry, they would often look longingly at his logs and plead with their eyes that they should have it to play with, their body language screamed, 'come on mate chuck us that stick, come on give us a go, I can do it', ... 'not blooming likely', he thought, 'get yer own.

Some painstaking while later, the logs were enjoying their first automobile trip and being driven home in luxury to be prepared for the Yuletide ceremony.

The day had come, the fire was kindled, small sticks crackled with delight as young flames and sparks danced above, then the log itself, cut to size. Slowly the log warmed to its task and turned from mottled brown to cherry red; the sun of many years that had lain dormant in the log was now released and rays of yellow orange sunshine poured into the room from the flames.

As the orang-utan in him settled into his comfy chair, feet stretched out to greet the warmth, the 'burner' of the logs sighed and truly appreciated the effort of the 'fetcher' of the logs, 'good chap' he thought, 'well done', and his heart gave thanks to the great log of the salt marsh.

As a small tribute to Tony Benn we quote the following extract from his diaries 2001/7 More time for Politics where he mentions a visit to Bideford.

Friday 16th July 2004

'Ruth (Ruth Winstone, editor of his diàries who lives in Bideford) gave a party for me at her house in a cobbled lane in what they call 'East the Water' over the bridge from Bideford. Her parents and her twin sister, her neighbours, Mrs Blight and Mrs Wilson who is 91 and still walks up the hill every day; Jon and Bridget who live on the hill.Some of the lads from the Appledore Shipyard -Dick Matthews and Gary Cook with his wife Heather. Sue Robinson who is the features editor of the North Devon Journal was there; Dr Peter Scott, a retired surgeon of 73 and Ron who worked on Ruth's house and Kathy. Also some local politicians; Councillor Hugo Barton and his wife Jinny who are Liberal Democrats, and Councillor William Isaac, an Independent. I was looking everywhere for a chair, so I sat on the stairs.' Previously he had visited Appledore shipyard and Bideford Library for their Readers' group.
