Armistice Day 1918

We mark the end of the First World War this month but how was the actual end in November 1918 greeted in Bideford? The first inkling that the conflict which had cost so many lives was over came at 9a.m. on November 11 when a 'beflagged motor car' from the RAF base at Westward Ho! drove into town with 'the joyful intelligence that the Germans had signed the Armistice.' The news was later officially confirmed by the Mayor A.R.Adams who, standing in front of the Post Office in High Street (now Ladbroke's) announced that hostilities had ceased at 11a.m. that morning.

His words were greeted 'with a great round of cheering and waving of colours.' Within a very short time flags and bunting were hung from nearly every house, the National Anthem echoed around the streets and the bells of St.Mary's were rung. All the town's factories were closed and at the request of the Mayor the afternoon became a half-day holiday with local bands including one from the Salvation Army and another from Appledore paraded the streets.

Amidst all this heartfelt joy the Mayor 'appealed to the public to be orderly in their rejoicing and to temper their celebrations with a thought for the feelings of those whose dear ones had rendered this great victory and peace possible by making the supreme sacrifice of their lives.' Given that some 200

townspeople had died during the war – and many more were to die over the next decade or so of wounds they had received during the fighting this was clearly a heartfelt plea.

Local life soon returned to normal with a general election and the demobilisation of men in the Forces even if rationing continued for some time and the 'Homes for Heroes' promised by the government didn't materialise. On November 11 all this was in the future and everyone must have felt the lifting of the terrible weight of war weariness that had engulfed the country in the months leading up to peace.

The Westward Ho! & Bideford Art Society

The prestigious Royal Society of Marine Artists selected paintings from society members Tony Williams and Colin Allbrook for display at their Annual Exhibition in London at the Mall Galleries near Trafalgar Square between 14th and 25th October 2015. This is now recognized as the most prestigious and varied exhibition of marine art in the UK.

Tony Williams is an established professional artist with a studio based in Kings Nympton, North Devon. His work was selected from over 1,000 submissions and they appeared alongside paintings by some of Britain's leading marine artists

In addition **Ćolin Allbrook**, who is a full Member of the Royal Society of Marine Artists, had six of his paintings on display. The result was an impressive display of creativity from North Devon artists at a major art exhibition in London.

The society includes painters, printmakers, sculptors, wood-carvers, potters and textile artists and has a long and historic link to the Bideford's Burton Art Gallery and Museum. Portraits from the Burton's Collection

There are many, dating from 1761, with Dr. Burton, by John Opie, to several in the 20th century, such as Hilda Trefusis' self-portrait, donated by Lord Clinton. Faces often reveal character, and there is one by Sir John Lavery of the artist, E. Aubrey Hunt: "Looking like a missionary who never made a convert." It's probably the hat, and the sideways look that gave rise to that remark! Mary Burton was an artist whose media was pencil, and her portrait of her Father, Thomas Burton, shows affection for the man as well as her talent to draw. (Thomas dedicated his Gallery to her when she tragically died in 1949 aged 43.) The Exhibition begins on **19th November** and continues until 1st February, 2016, and each time you visit you will discover something new.



The Open Annual Christmas Exhibition returns to the Gallery on Saturday, 28th November, and the selected works of art will be on show in gallery 2 until 28th December, which means that the Gallery will be open after Christmas for visitors to enjoy. Artists from all over our region have been invited to submit their work for selection, and we look forward to a show of creative talent, with paintings, sculpture, ceramics, textiles and original prints. Everything on show is for sale, and as the exhibition is supported by the Friends of the Burton Gallery, all proceeds from sales will go towards the Friends' funds. The Friends give generously to the Gallery by funding exhibitions, furniture, the Young Friends, schools' coach travel expenses, the Bideford Black display case, and much more. "Much Sought After Des Res" in the countryside.

One of the iconic features of our north Devon countryside has long been the numerous old farm buildings of cob and stone construction, many of which are now redundant because of changing

farming methods. Over the years very many such barns have been tastefully converted into dwellings, sometimes for expanding farming families and sometimes for sale to incomers who bring their purchasing power to back up the local economy. Such conversions have always had to satisfy stringent planning regulations to protect the countryside from exploitation which could spoil the rural character of north Devon.

In 2013 the government brought in new "Permitted Development Rights" which were intended to bring prosperity to the countryside

by allowing the conversion of agricultural buildings into dwellings without the requirement for planning permission or any justification of local need for the dwellings so produced. It is merely necessary to obtain confirmation from the District Council that the building to be converted conforms with a set list of conditions to ensure that it is suitable.

This is not necessarily a bad thing when you think of attractive stone and cob barns being rescued from decay and given a new lease of life as homes for farmers' sons and daughters who would otherwise have to move away in order to set up home and raise a family, or even to be sold to raise capital to tide the farmers over the financial crises that seem to come in quick succession these days.

No doubt this was the benevolent reasoning behind the government's legislative changes but, as always, there is the law of unintended consequences lurking behind every good intention. In this case it was the term "agricultural building" that formed the weak link in the regulations and soon every owner of a rusty corrugated iron shack or pole barn that had been forgotten in the corner of a field had scented easy money and, egged on by planning consultants, were submitting "Prior Notification" applications to the Council's planning department.

In the first twelve months of the scheme, according to a BBC report, Torridge council had to reject 50 out of 57 of these applications, mainly because the applicants had not understood the rules and submitted proposals that were not appropriate. More recently, nearly half of all such applications have been approved and any farmer with a nice stone barn that is surplus to requirements is likely to be permitted to convert it, but there is still the occasional case where someone who has bought a pony paddock (horses are not classed as agriculture) with a corrugated iron shelter made from old telegraph poles thinks he can then convert it into a country residence on the cheap. Our Planning Officers at TDC are very helpful, but not stupid and such a chancer is likely to get short shrift

Bats are endangered species and are often found in old barns. It is illegal to disturb them so this is another factor which should be taken into consideration. Traditional agriculture, and our countryside that was formed by agriculture and supports agriculture, is Torridge's greatest asset and needs our support in the constant battle against exploitation.

The Catcher in the Rye by JD Salinger discussed by Bideford Library Readers' Group. The books we read are supplied by Devon Library Services and the group never knows in advance what we'll get next. This can be a good thing in that it can take you outside your comfort zone in terms of reading material. For the third consecutive month we have had a book that could be regarded as a 'classic'. (Who determines what is considered 'classic' and what *Christie for this.*) isn't?). This writer is no fan of the so called classics but, along with most of the group, found this an enjoyable read. Only one member was disappointed with it.

The story is written in the first person by Holden Caulfield, a disaffected teenager who repeatedly refers to the 'phoniness' of the adult world. The book covers a few days in his life when he runs away after he's been expelled from his fourth school. Throughout there is a sense of adolescent alienation and loss of innocence. He is struggling to come to terms with the death of his brother, is afraid to go home to tell his parents that he's been expelled and finds it difficult to relate to anyone. He is desperately lonely. Nobody seems to notice he is falling apart.

Some time after the book was published JD Salinger admitted that the book was 'sort of' autobiographical, explaining, "My boyhood was very much the same as that of the boy in the book ... He'd had his own difficulties settling at school, struggling to conform. In later life he struggled with the unwanted attention that came

Free Online Magazines from your Local Library

Devon Libraries has a new service that allows you to read the latest magazines like Hello! or National Geographic at home, free of charge. It's called Zinio and in the parts of the country where it has been running for some time it is proving to be incredibly popular. To access this service simply follow the Zinio link on our website www.devon.gov.uk/libraries. You will need your library membership number (if you're not a member pop in and join up) and once you have set up a simple account you can select the magazine you want to read. They are the full versions, available on the day of publication and look exactly like the paper copies. You can read them in your browser or if you download an App you can read them offline on your tablet or smartphone. A couple of technical points: You must follow the link from our website to access the site and not just find it via Google. You need to download the **Zinio for Libraries App** and not the ordinary Zinio App. Doing either of these things will mean you will have to pay to access the magazines! Ask library staff for more details.

Appledore A Personal View

Believe it or not, the Appledore Book Festival is now in its ninth year. The reasons I like to make my three mile annual pilorimage to Appledore are many: it gives you the chance to pilgrimage to Appledore are many: it gives you the chance to

see and hear your literary heroes in person, the talks are very often amusing, always informative, sometimes even moving, the tickets are relatively cheap, and one may occasionally be inspired to read, or even buy, one of the books being discussed.

The Festival took place between 25 September – 4 October. My first port of call was Ann Widdecombe. She was not only amusing, she was hilarious, as she regaled us with tales of what she had been doing since last appearing at the festival two years ago, basically appearing on Strictly, then in pantomime with Craig Revel-Horwood, featuring in an opera, and presenting various television programmes, as well as writing her fourth novel, The Dancing Detective.

Next was John Riddington-Young also very amusing, arguing that many of the old ways of working in the NHS were superior to those now operating, and should be re-introduced. Then it was the turn of 6'7"man-mountain, Terry Waite, who whilst starting off amusingly, soon took us into the dark world of hostage negotiation, which was of course what he was doing before he was famously taken hostage himself, and was kept in solitary confinement for four and a half years. The two things he craved for at this time (apart from human company) were a decent meal and books. Later I went to see Ben Kane, the historian, who gave a talk on the Battle of the Teutoberg Forest in AD 9, where the Germanic tribes in flicted on the Roman Empire its greatest defeat.

I went along to hear Satish Kumar, an ex-Jain monk, and, at 79, the elder statesman of the ecology movement, who gave an impassioned talk on the subject of his latest book, Soil, Soul and Society. He lives at Hartland, founded the SchumacherCollege in South Devon, and edits the magazine Resurgence, which this year celebrates its fiftieth anniversary.

Then a two day break, before going to hear Elkie Brooks being interviewed by Judi Spiers, about her life and autobiography, Finding My Voice.

Lastly, on the Sunday, I went to see Vince Cable, the politician, talking about his latest book, After The Storm, and the aftermath of the recent economic crisis. To me, he always seems to be the wise old man of politics (though he's only six years older than me!), especially on economic matters. I was pleased when was appointed to the Coalition cabinet, as Business Secretary, but I think he lost his seat at the last election, so one of our wisest politicians is now without power. Such is life.

The Book Festival this year coincided with the best weather of the summer. I'm sure that those people who travelled long distances to get there, as well as us locals, went home with fond memories of Appledore and its Festival. I certainly did. Chris Trigger



Felicity's sustainable seasonal fish

November is the month when the winter fish becomes available. Herrings come into Clovelly and the Clovelly Herring festival, that has now become an established

annual event will be on Sunday 15th this year. Just as we make jams and jellies from fruit and chutneys and pickles from vegetables, oily fish such as mackerel and herrings can be soused and made into rollmops.



Here is a recipe for roll mop herrings, based on Hugh Fearnley Whittingstall's recipe-

Cider Vinegar and Orange Rollmops

You can also use large sardines or mackerel Ingredients

6/10 fresh herrings(Clovelly herrings are smaller than supermarket ones)

de scaled gutted and filleted-being careful to remove the fin bones with scissors. 60g salt

for the marinade-

750ml cider vinegar

12 allspice, 12 black peppercorns,6 bay leaves. 1 tablespoon light brown sugar.

Zest of 1 large orange, pared in wide strips -no white pith.

1 onion, red or white sliced very thinly Method

1. Dissolve the the salt in 500ml water to make a Sunday buffet, -more about this next month! brine, then add the fillets. leave for 2-3 hours. 2. Meanwhile, put all the ingredients in a

saucepan, bring slowly to the boil and simmer for bread is delicious to soak up the tasty juices.

just 1 minute. Remove from the heat and leave. 3. Drain the herring fillets from the brine and pat dry with kitchen paper. Roll them up from tail to head end ,skin side out and pack the the rolls into sterilised preserving jars.


Ready for launch

Anything for a free nibble) no; it was the launch of Tanya Landman's new book. Decked out with bunting, cake and a gaggling throng of guests, it was more like a market scene from 'Hell and High Water' itself- all be it with the thieves and clergymen subtly replaced by booksellers and members of the press- than the school library; think Fat Sam's Grand Slam, merely posing as a book shop.
