

# Rosalie Chichester (1866-1949), the last of the Chichesters of Arlington.

Part of our Connections Series

Rosalie Chichester was the only daughter of the flamboyant Sir Bruce Chichester of Arlington. The family can be traced back to the Norman Conquest, and have owned property and land all over North Devon, but the largest estate is **Arlington Court** (currently about 3.500 acres), a Georgian country house, built in the neoclassical style, by local architect Thomas Lee in 1822.

Rosalie was born there. She was fortunate to travel extensively all over the world on two separate trips before she was out of her teens. Her father was a keen yachtsman, owning two yachts, the 'Zoe' and the 'Erminia', and used to sail with his family to the Mediterrannean, visiting Sintra (in Portugal), Malaga, Malta and Naples.

Rosalie also travelled around the world, visiting Canada, New Zealand, Australia and South Africa with her companion Miss Chrissie Peters, (almost unheard of for women in those days.)



She made extensive sketches of her travels, and her sketchbooks are still extant. She was an animal-lover, and many of the animals on the estate today, including the ponies and sheep, are descendants of the stock that she introduced. She abhorred fox-hunting, and banned it from her estate, much to the chagrin of the local huntsmen. The ban was not always observed, and on several occasions, to their further annoyance, she took people to court for trespassing on her land.

Her travels probably started her mania for collecting. Amongst other things, she collected costumes, model yachts and boats, British and foreign shells, pewter, snuff boxes, tea caddies, paperweights, examples of scrimshaw (pieces of ornately decorated whalebone), and fossils.

Her favourite piece was a red amber elephant from China. After her death, when the National Trust came to do an inventory, they found an original William Blake painting gathering dust on the top of a cupboard.

She spent much time managing the estate, but she was also an avid painter, photographer and gardener.

She never married, and two years before her death, willed the house and its grounds to the National Trust, who have run it since 1949.

Since 1966, Arlington Court has housed the National Carriage Collection, and is also well known as a bat sanctuary.

Of course, her early adventures may have inspired her better-known nephew, Sir Francis Chichester, the famous aviator and yachtsman, but Rosalie deserves to be remembered in her own right for keeping her estate in good condition for posterity to enjoy. Her ashes are buried beneath an urn near a lake in the grounds, but her real monument is the house and grounds itself.



#### In support of the Visually Impaired

The Torridgeside Talking Newspaper, best known for its distribution of weekly recordings of the local papers for the blind, has recently been in touch with other charities whose sole concern is the visually impaired.

Meetings with officials representing the Macular Society, the Blind Club and a local government official, one of whose responsibilities is care for the blind, have produced interesting results and the Talking Newspaper will continue to encourage these sessions it says.

A spokesman for the Newspaper said "As a wider group there is a lot more we can do to assist the visually impaired beyond, of course, just creating awareness of their plight." **John Henderson.** 

'Bideford Library has over 500 unabridged audio books available for loan to its members and the stock is regularly refreshed as stock is circulated around Devon Libraries. The normal hire charge for these is £2 for a three-week loan but for people with a visual impairment they are free to borrow. Across the whole of Devon Libraries there are over twenty five thousand audio books in stock so if it's not on the shelves in a particular library it can probably be requested from another branch. Again, the request service is free for VIPs. The books come in three formats: audio CDs, MP3 CDs and a dedicated MP3 device known as a Playaway. For more information, contact your local library.' 



A line of thought

Some of the Torrington – Bideford commuters suffering inconvenience on the obligatory diversion route via Monkleigh could be wishing it was still possible to do a nine minute journey between the two places by train.

Sadly this line was closed in the 1960s; prior to this it was possible to board the train at Torrington or Bideford and travel direct to / from London Waterloo without a change.

The 'flagship' of this route was the 'multi-portioned' Atlantic coast express which carried portions for diverse terminals at Ilfracombe, Torrington, Bude, Padstow and



Plymouth (Friary.) Significantly 2016 marks the 90th anniversary of its introduction in 1926.

An unfortunate sequel to any rail closure is the ripping up of its track and obliteration of its infrastructure.

In this respect Torrington is the sole surviving terminal of the once famous train, the other four terminals having been demolished or re developed for non railway purposes. In fact Torrington is in advanced negotiations to extend its existing track northwards to Beam and Weare Giffard.

## Fay, the homeless. A short story

Gathered together in friendship, warm and comfortable around the window table of Maxime's café, the small group of ladies only had eyes for the fine patisseries and only ears for the

inane tittle tattle gossip of the middle classes.

They neither saw nor heard Fay's frail body sheltering from the rain, huddled against the low window of the grand entrance. Fay sought refuge there night and day but few ever noticed her presence or predicament and even fewer cared. They walked on by, blabbing mindlessly on their mobile phones, never even noticing, not aware of her cry for help. Despite her grubby and tattered clothes she was a pretty young woman of Chinese descent and had at one time been employed as a dish washer at Maxime's. Life had taken a decided and irrevocable turn for the worse since the accident. Her home was now occupied by others, her job taken by a stranger and she had no one to talk to, no one to share her troubles and no shoulder to cry on. Try as she might, she could find no one who would listen, and try, she had. Fay had long since stopped feeling the cold and damp of the English weather; somehow it didn't affect her anymore like it did those hurrying by with warm scarf and long coat.

The boisterous conversation in the café lurched from, 'of course our mortgage's paid off', to 'hubby's new job' and 'the boss has his own yacht,' to 'how well the children are doing at university,' 'of course Rupert wants to be a doctor you know', well 'Daniel, our new under-gardener is so attractive and insists on bringing fresh fl owers to the house for me every day,' 'we might move soon, there are some awful working class people buying a house in the village,' 'cousin Matilda has a new book published you know '... I don't think I should eat any more cake ... perhaps I'll just have a special coffee to round it off, 'Cointreau coffee here please, waiter.'

The effectively indiscernible Fay could both hear and see it all but it made no difference, she could never be one of them, it seemed her lot to endure the desolation of forever

hopelessness, alone and homeless, unseen by the passing wealthy and poor alike.

The waiter keenly approached the ladies group, rubbing his hands with anticipation of a good tip. "Where's my coffee?' asked the cake filled lady who incidentally kept her posh hat on even indoors, 'Harrods you know . . . and not in a sale either!'

Grovellingly ingratiating himself to the group the waiter feigned a sincere apology and explained that they were short staffed due to the accident outside the café the other week. "Hit and run driver, probably drunk, in a new BMW had run over and killed the Chinese girl who used to wash up. Not to worry, we've a new one but she's still learning. All will be back to normal soon. I'll fetch your coffee, ma'am."

Outside in the mizzling rain, Fay's ghost would indeed be forever homeless and like so many others in shop doorways, simply invisible to any kindness, any justice.

#### **Bucket List**

My daughter has just returned from Kerala. I am mightily jealous. Not least because it has always been on my bucket list. What makes it worse is that my daughter had a wonderful time, which I know is a good thing but, I am now going to act in a very childish way, I wanted to go first! I have had a desire to visit Kerala for years and years and now that I know that it is exactly what I hoped it would be I want to go even more. There is a tangible feeling of goodwill and joy, of friendliness and happiness. India is a very spiritual place. If any of you have recently watched the Real Marigold Hotel on BBC2, which was filmed in Jaipur, and the change that some of the cast experienced you begin to get a sense of what India is really all about.

There are sun drenched beaches, high mountains and hills planted with tea shrubs, kingfishers, (who has always wanted to see king fishers?) I have only ever seen one once and it was only the flash of orange and iridescent blue that I caught, but my heart lifted. Elephants, monkeys and waterfalls. Then there are the people themselves who, according to my daughter, could not be more friendly, helpful and smiley. Perhaps it is the meditation and the yoga or their deep rooted beliefs in family life. Or maybe it is the practise of ashram, the literal meaning comes from the Sanskrit root srama which means "to toil", the "a" prefix indicates the negative, therefore ashram means "not to toil". We could all do with some time for ashram in our life. The notion of consciously choosing not to toil is very appealing. It worked for many of the cast in the Real Marigold Hotel series.

People get to a certain age, begin to take stock of their lives, and measure achievements. A recently completed survey from Harvard University which lasted for seventy five years found that what made people happy and healthy was not fame and fortune but good relationships. Whether this be in a marriage, friendship, work, family or social environment. People needed to be with people. But not just any person. Those people that they needed to be with also needed to be positive people. I wholeheartedly believe this. They also concluded that those people who did not socialise and have a wide circle of friends and interests were more likely to be ill, suffer pain more acutely and be very lonely. So, just take a moment to write your Bucket List. Don't look back at what you have not done yet, but what you still can do in the future. It doesn't have to be life changing or expensive. For me the biggest challenge will be to go to Kerala. I was recently diagnosed with osteoarthritis and will have to have both hips replaced soon, this feels me with dread,

but knowing that I will have something to aim for feels me with positivity. I also want to finish writing my book and get it published. I would also like to make some bunting out of some old bits of material, learn how to play euchre, sing in a choir, make a willow basket, make yoghurt from scratch, have a go at smoking a whole salmon, watch England play Rugby at Twickenham, abseil down a taller building than I did last time......the list is endless once you get started. Go on start your list, ticking off the list is one of the most satisfying things ever.

I will never forget driving my friend's Porsche, scared the life out of me. Or riding in a limousine down to watch Ascot on Ladies Day, or being lucky enough to watch Red Rum parade around Aintree before the Grand National. Tomorrow is another day to not to toil, make the most of it.

Kerala is on my bucket list of places to visit. I am running out of time Ildi McIndoe.

## News from the Burton Art gallery & Museum

'Contemporary British Watercolours' which began on 24th March, continues until 9th May, so we have a good few weeks in which to enjoy it. There are 21 British artists taking part, and their names will mostly be new to us, as this exhibition demonstrates the 21st century approach to our usual conception of what is called 'British' art.

Bertram Prance – 'Humour and Light': what an appropriate title for this talented artist's cartoons and gouache paintings! The Gallery is privileged to own quite a large selection of Bertram's work, collected over the years from donations, and gifts from his son, Christopher. Bertram was born in Bideford in 1889, and trained at the Bideford Science, Art & Technical School, now the Art Centre on the Quay, and was praised for his skill in the Gazette's report from that establishment on many occasions from 1906 while a student. On leaving Bideford for London, he became a member of the Savage Club, where he met other artists, and was elected President of the Sketch Club in 1948. His pen sketches were published in 'The Tatler', and he illustrated for a 'Punch' magazine contributor, Anthony Armstrong. From then on his humorous cartoons were much in demand, and the list of periodicals and newspapers using his work is endless. Prepare yourself for a good laugh, but also take time to admire his gouache paintings: landscapes, street scenes, and his technique with cloud formations. His son, Christopher, is giving a free 'Talk and Tour' of his father's work on Saturday, 9th April, at 2.00.

**Vicky Lindo'**s latest creations are in the Craft Gallery collection. Her sense of humour comes over in all her work; the funny things that cats get up to, is one of her favourite subjects. Her work is bold and simple, and very buyable. Enjoy it until 30<sup>th</sup> April.

# Felicity's Seasonal Local Fish and Restaurant Review

Please send in you details to the editor if you would like to come along to the April restaurant visit for the May review! Thanks.

I went to see the new extension to the Coffee Cabin on Appledore Quay. This is a very popular modern café serving wonderful breakfasts, lunches and great cakes. And, of course, good coffee.

There is now a small airy upstairs area with a view of the two rivers, where the Taw and the Torridge meet. Everyone is made most welcome-families, couple groups of friends and single people. Always lots of local information. The cabin supports local food producers including -Dan the fish man, Cottage Bakery and Torridge Mussel and Oyster company-Here is a good mussel recipe with cheesy rarebits, the latter suitable for vegetarians!

I leek, trimmed and finely sliced 25g(1oz) flour 1x330ml bottle beer- Clearwater Brewery beers are good! 125g(4oz) Cheddar grated 1or 2 tbsp. Dijon mustard 8 slices of Toast - sourdough, granary or white.



#### Method

- 1. For the rarebits -melt the butter in a pan. Add the leeks and cook until softened. Stir in the flour, cook for 2mins.then stir in 125ml(4floz) beer, the cheese and 1 tbsp. mustard. Season with a little black pepper. Let stand to combine. 2. In a lidded pan melt the remaining butter. Add the shallots and fry for 5 mins. or until golden. Add the garlic and the remaining beer, leave to bubble for 2 3 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, spread the rarebit mixture on the bread. Toast under a hot grill until melted and golden.
- 4. Tip in the mussels, then cover the pan with the lid and steam for 4-5minutes.until opened (discard any that remain closed). Transfer the mussels to a serving bowl, leaving the liquor in the pan. Whisk the cream parsley into the remaining mustard into the mussel liquor. Season. Pour over the mussels. Serve with the rarebits. Good to share with family and friends.

## 100 years ago -April 1916

Mr A W Cock has auctioned three freehold properties in the town. These were 7 Elm Grove, 13 Vinegar Hill and a dwelling house and stables at 1 Bull Hill, the latter premises formerly known as The Cornish Arms.

Bideford Borough Council holds tribunals every week, sitting in the Town Hall, to hear and determine applications for exemption from military service. Herniman Prust Woodyard, 32 years old and a proprietor of a grocery and provisions merchant's business, was granted exemption as long as he remains in his present occupation. He has been left single handed as both his assistants have joined up and his 5 brothers are already serving in the Army.

Albert Henry Prance, a Fish and chip shop proprietor, claimed that his wife could not carry on the business which would have to be closed if he went to war. It was obvious that such a business was a great advantage to the people living in the neighbourhood. He was granted a one month exemption.

Any ladies who are interested in Motor Cycling should inspect the latest model, the "Royal Ruby" 2 stroke motorcycle, perfect in every detail, now on show at Messrs George Boyle, 1 Allhalland Street.

At a meeting of Bideford Urban District Council it was decided that the names of those who had volunteered for the war should be displayed on boards fixed on to the Market walls.

The Taw & Torridge Fishery Conservators heard a status report from the Superintendent Water Bailiff. Large numbers of salmon have passed through the town and on to the upper waters of both rivers. Salmon fishing was very good and a good number of fish have been taken. The weather has been too cold for trout fishing

Henry Hopkins of Bideford was summoned for *using* headlights on his motorcycle at 10.10pm on 29<sup>th</sup> March. He pleaded guilty through ignorance. Superintendent Hulland said that under current wartime regulations, no headlights were to be carried within a 6 miles of the sea or estuary. Mr Hopkins was fined 2/6d.
