Rolle Canal Walk - a message from Chris Hassell

Each Autumn, I find myself wondering will spring really follow on again in six months time, and will I still be here to see it?

Well, here we are at the beginning of May and I'm once again sitting down to invite you all to a walk by the Rolle Canal on Sunday afternoon May 15th at 2.30pm. This walk explores the northern end of the canal from Annery Kiln, south along the Torridge flood meadows to Ridd where, in the 19th century, the canal boats were hauled up an incline to the canal's upper level which continued along the valley to Rowe's Moor, now Rosemoor Gardens south of Torrington.

Of course it's almost 150 years since the canal ceased to function and the landscape around it has altered beyond recognition, with the railway and then the Tarka Trail usurping its route along the valley side, and saplings that sprang up by the railway now grown into tall trees. Little remains of the Rolle Canal itself, but the canal society guides know all the clues that point to hidden features that the casual visitor would miss. There's not only canal history to discover, as along the route will be wildflowers in profusion, with Yellow Archangel beside the Tarka Trail and Early Purple and Twayblade Orchids (see picture) in the dry canal basin. The first quarter of a mile is over rough grass meadow which may be wet if there's been rain but after that the route is on the Tarka Trail.

The start point is at Annery Kiln, by Halfpenny Bridge on the Weare Giffard road off the A386. The actual distance walked is little over a mile, so any keen walkers can come along the Tarka Trail from Bideford, leaving at the Weare Giffard exit to get to the start. The same route is also ideal for cyclists. The event is organised by the Rolle Canal and Northern Devon Waterways Society and a contribution of £2 per person will be appreciated.

'Harvest' by Jim Crace Discussed by Bideford Library Readers' Group.

'Harvest' was on the short-list for the Man Booker prize in 2013 and we all thought it was an exceedingly well-written book, though some of us found it difficult to get into. Despite the violence, we did not feel that it was an emotional read. This may have something to do with the way the story is told. The narrator is a middle-aged widower, Walter Thirsk, and he is an observer of all the many misfortunes that befall his village over a short period of time. Although he had lived there for ten years, he still feels an outsider.

The story is set sometime in the past when communal held land is being enclosed and given over to sheep rearing. As Walter describes it, the village is being surrendered "to the yellow teeth of three thousand sheep". He chronicles the breakup of a tightly knit community and its descent into chaos. Crace has been compared to William Golding and there is something of the feel of Lord of the Flies in the way the old order disintegrates. There are also religious overtones. Is Eden being destroyed? Walter talks of the coming felling of the woods "which linked us with eternity", the grizzled oak which "must have come from Eden". The stocks are compared to crosses and the field Mistress Beldame's husband ploughs is, for one day, "a field in heaven rather than on earth". The action takes place over seven days. But instead of a world being created in seven days, it is a world being destroyed. Man is losing his close relationship with the land, with disastrous consequences. As relevant today as it was then.

The power of the book lies in the language. Crace has an amazing feel for the minutiae of landscape. We feel right in that village, the way that the seasons is touch the woods and lanes and fields. We see, hear and smell with Walter. There is a haunting quality which remains long after the book is finished.

The Mayor Mr F R Chope hopes that in view of the Daylight Saving Bill having been passed by parliament no public lamps should be lit in the town during June, July and August.

Paper saving

The Bideford UDC have decided to grant the Bideford Chamber of Trade rent free use of a loft at the market for the collection and disposal of waste paper which will be sent away and repulped. This will alleviate the shortage and deficiency created by restricted importation of wood pulp. The action would also considerably lessen the need for horses and manual labour. The store is over the Borough Fish Market and a paper baler will be purchased at a cost of £19:0:0d. Waste paper will be collected 3 times each week and can also be brought in.

Sapper W H Westlake, Royal Engineers, of Chanters Road Bideford has received the Silver medal of the Russian Order of St George fourth class in recognition of gallant services at the second Battle of Ypres. Sapper Westlake was formerly in charge of Bideford Telephone Exchange and was a prominent member of the swimming club.

Lance Corporal Fred T Cole, in acknowledging the receipt of a pair of knitted socks from Bideford, mentioned that they were spoilt when he took them into action in the pocket of his British Warm coat on March 8th. Only one bullet went through them but as the socks were folded it made so many holes that they were useless.

Lundy – Wartime Farming Problems

In May 1940, Martin Coles Harman, the owner of Lundy, made the surprising decision to lease the island for a period of ten years to a Mr. Herbert A. Van Os. His reasons have never been fully understood, but the difficulties of reaching the island during the war, provisioning the island and the shortage of staff may all have contributed to this decision. It is known that Mr. Felix William Gade, agent and administrator of Lundy from 1925 to 1971, was totally against this leasing arrangement. In his memoirs entitled *"My Life on Lundy"* published in 1978, and in chapter 10, Mr. Gade tells us exactly what he thought of Mr. Van Os and his abilities as a farmer.

Van Os had a small farming business in Middlesex and persuaded Martin Coles Harman that he could run the farm on Lundy to a profit. He brought a couple of men with him, who turned out to have had no farming experience whatsoever, and a lady to run the hotel and shop. Mr. Gade and his wife Rene moved into Millcombe House, the home of the owners, with the remit of simply keeping a watchful eye on the farm activities.

In fact Gade still had to perform many of the farm tasks, such as sheep sheering, ploughing and repairing and maintaining of machinery as Van Os and his men were quite incapable of performing these tasks. The sheep were uncared for and most lambs died, the crops were not harvested in time and rotted in the fields and the deer were shot in large numbers, including the last of the fallow deer. The shippons were not cleared of dung and the cows not milked on time. One of the only two work horses on the island was allowed to die of a chill. The whole farming structure of the island was virtually wrecked and left in ruins when Van Os finally departed.

Probably at Gade's suggestion, Martin Coles Harman came down, alone, to Lundy for Christmas 1941 and after discussions with Van Os which were likely to have been very heated, although Gade in his memoirs does not specifically say so, in February 1942 Van Os and his employees departed Lundy.



The Gades soldiered on for the rest of the war, restoring and

running the farm and keeping the island supplied and dealing with the few visitors that were able to get there. There was a small Royal Navy Contingent of men billeted at the Old Light and the Light House keepers to provide occasional volunteer work, plus one or two other workers that remained. The island had no ship of its own during the war and all ships and visitors to the island, including even the owners, had to obtain permits from Admiral H. G. Franklin, the commandant of the Appledore and estuary area, who handed them out grudgingly.

Documents with the signature of Herbert Van Os from the period he was on Lundy are very rare but a single item, a postcard, is in the collection of the writer of these notes. It is dated Nov 1941, and indicates that at least some farming activity was carried on during that unfortunate time. Typically, no postage stamps were placed on the card, which bears postage due stamps for 4d.

Addressed to Messrs G. T. Andrews & Sons Ltd., Town Mills, Barnstaple, the text ran as follows:-"We have today shipped to you the undermentioned:-

46 lbs Locks.

7 lbs Fleece.

The above will be laying at Royal Navy Stores, The Quay, Appedore. Hope that you can collect when in district. Have you sent off poultry grain and have I coupons for a sack of middlings? (Signed) Herbert Van Os."

This short text actually says quite a lot. It shows that sheep were being shorn, even though probably by Mr. Gade, and that the wool was being transferred and sold on the mainland. Interestingly the fleeces were being deposited in the Royal Naval Stores at Appledore, under the beady eye of Admiral Franklin no doubt. It is also worthy of note that in war time, farmers still needed 'coupons' to purchase some of their supplies, in the same way as ration books were issued to the ordinary citizens. And what are 'Middlings' ?

This story of Herbert Van Os and Lundy during wartime is covered in much greater detail by Mr. Gade in his memoirs, as indeed he covers almost every moment of the last 53 years of his life that he spent on Lundy. **Roger Allen**

News from the Burton Art Gallery & Museum

As from 1st April, 2016, the Burton Gallery is being managed by a Trust. This has taken a year to put in place, and there is now a Chairman, Judith Gentry, and at present, five Trustees. The Gallery was formerly under the aegis of Torridge District Council, who still own it and its collection of works of art. There is no change there, but the Trustees and Gallery staff will now be responsible for staffing, for exhibitions and displays. We sincerely hope that the Gallery's future is in good hands,



and that it will prosper and develop for years to come, and that there will always be funding to keep Bideford's treasures and its greatest asset safe and open for the community, and the nation, to enjoy in perpetuity.

Exhibitions to enjoy during May (until 23rd) include a wonderful collection of cartoons, gouache paintings and sketches by Bideford-born artist and illustrator, <u>Bertram Prance</u>.

Bertram was eventually much sought after as an illustrator and cartoonist, and you will laugh out loud when you see them, for sure. They reflect the 1930s, but the jokes and humour are ageless. When you realise that Bertram used just one nib for his pen, both thin and thick strokes were with just the one pen – you will be amazed at the variety of strokes, and his ability to show movement, his characters don't just stand still, they are very active.

From 21st May until 4th July, Rachael Howard's '<u>Red Work'</u> is on show. Rachael is a textile artist, and her work will raise a smile. She celebrates the joys and frustrations of family life and everyday happenings with her lively creations. Her use of textiles is so smooth, that many of her works appear like paintings, and a closer look will reveal her special skills with fabric.

Bideford Blues and Appledore Junior Football Club

We are a Youth Football Club catering for boys and girls from ages 6 to 16 around 300 in all. Qualified coaches manage all teams and we currently have teams playing in either the North Devon Opticop or Kingsley Leagues.

We began in our current form in the late 1970s at the instigation of Barry Davies and the late Dave Barrett. At the time there were only 9 teams in two age groups in the whole of North Devon! Now there are 100 teams!

Initially all home games were played at Bideford Park. In the early 1990s Eric Palmer and Peter Evans began to explore possibilities of purchasing new land for pitches. In 1999, following the hard work of committee members, such as Andy Lobato, Tony Sawyer and Anne Oliver among others, the facility [Pictured above] opened at Sandymere at a cost of over half a million pounds, much of which was funded by Sport England's Lottery Fund.

This gave the Club its own home for the first time and included a state of the art floodlit astro surface (at the time of laying it was only the second of its type in the country and was visited by league clubs to check on its suitability before installing one themselves!) Ownership of this facility has been instrumental in the expansion of the Club.

In the past there have been close links with Plymouth Argyle, with one of its soccer schools taking place at Sandymere. From here, higher ability players were fed into the Argyle Academy at Plymouth. As a result former club members have gone on to play with League clubs - David Downing at York, Nicky Spry at Aldershot (both clubs were in the league at the time), Luke Guttridge at Southend, Gary Sawyer currently a regular at Argyle and Marc Edworthy who has played in the Premiership with Crystal Palace, Coventry and Derby. Marc may be possibly the only player to have participated in Championship playoffs at the old and new Wembley and at the Millennium Stadium, Cardiff! Danny Seaborne is currently Exeter's centre back and many former Blues members have gone on to play in the Western League.

May 2009 the Club was awarded the FA Charter Standard, which demonstrated the Club's commitment to raising the standard of the Club. They were then awarded the Community Charter standard, which saw the Club being held as the F.A's "Beacon Club" for Devon. This was a remarkable and most welcome achievement.

2009 ended with the award of match funding for a new state of the art 3G Artificial Grass Pitch ; this had been a major achievement putting Bideford Blues & Appledore JFC on the footballing map within the local community for years to come. **Neil Blackburn**

Ticket fees will be £22, and grant access to every track, though so far he's kept quiet about the listings. Despite its release in cinemas this month, Eddie the Eagle's theme "touching hearts and skies" is unlikely to be on the song list- Midge Ure wrote it, but lugging a full piece orchestra up the High Street is quite a challenge for someone who doesn't know the area, so a simpler rendition may be all we can hope for. Felicity's Sustainable Fish Recipe and Restaurant Visit

Ingredients

2 Spring onions, finely chopped

2 garlic cloves-chopped 1 kg(2lb) fresh mussels, cleaned and beards removed

1 tbsp. cream

I was contacted by a reader this month and Fiona and I had lunch at the Pier House, Westward Ho! We ordered 4 varied starters, Chowder, Squid and Choritzo and Mussels Mariniere. Our favourite was the Crab and Cod Fishcakes with Saffron Mayo. The restaurant was really busy and the service was great with friendly, helpful, and informative waiters. As you all know the view is amazing across Bideford Bay and the Atlantic Ocean.

Here is a recipe for Saffron Mayo -suitable for an accompaniment for grilled fish and any fish salad.

Saffron Mayo

Ingredients 150g Mayonnaise 1⁄4 teaspoon Saffron Powder/Ground Saffron Squeeze of fresh Lemon Juice 150ml Natural Yoghurt **Method**

- 1. If you can source Saffron Powder-this recipe is easy!
- 2. To produce the ground saffron -dry fry the strands very briefly for 5 secs in a hot pan until crisp, then grind in a pestle and mortar. This can then be stored for future use.
- 3. Combine all the ingredients and chill.
- 4. Makes 300ml of primrose and gold coloured light mayonnaise.

The Bideford Appledore Connection

2016 was the 50th anniversary of England winning the world cup. It is also the anniversary of a rowing race when two boats crossed from the USA to England - unlike today's rowers, with no support vessel.

John Ridgway and Chay Blyth successfully did the crossing in ninety two days and were hailed at the time as the first men to row the Atlantic.

However two Norwegians, Frank Samuelson and George Harbo also completed the crossing in 1896 arriving after fifty five days on the Scillies.

Two other men raced against Ridgway and Blyth. David Johnson and John Hoare left Virginia in their tiny boat, 'Puffin" (only 15ft in length with a beam of 5ft 6.)Tragically both men lost their lives, probably in the area of 'Hurricane Faith.'

In October 1966 the Canadian ship "Chaudiere' sighted an upturned hull of a small boat (Puffin). Copies of the ship's log were found on board stating that on 6th June, a ship was sighted by them which stopped and gave them food, beer and cigarettes. The ship was "Orient City' Bideford . She had a yellow funnel with a red stripe and a yellow star. 'Orient City' was one of many ships owned by William Reardon Smith who was born in Appledore in 1856. He became a successful shipowner and founded his own company William Reardon Smith and sons, based in Cardiff. **Eric Stallard**
