Heritage Day 2012

What a wonderful day that was! Bright sunshine, blue sky, giant cotton wool clouds and a freshening wind making sure it was not too hot, what more could one ask? My first impression was in the Pannier Market, where I found a mass of people for the first time in a very long time. I was really impressed by those who had taken the day to heart and appeared in Tudor or Elizabethan garb, the way one dressed in 1591. [Garb from the French garbe meaning graceful outline and Italian garbé meaning grace and elegance]. There must be something in the souls of all of us that hankers after that period in our history because of Grenville, Raleigh, Drake and the men of Devon, many of whom still await the call of Drake's drum. So many stall holders were in period dress that those of us wearing 'modern' guise really felt out of place and rightly so.

On a day like this potters, painters, weavers, lace makers, archers ,leather workers, wood turners, herbalists, dress makers, scribes, etcetera etcetera all appear from



apparent oblivion and are given a chance to shine. Their appearance really warms my soul because so many of these skills and interests have, theoretically, been wiped from our brains by the blotting paper of television. Why are these people not encouraged more every day? Why do we not take more advantage of their individual living skills rather than accept every foreign item that is thrust upon us and clogs our shops? When I was a boy spring onions came from our garden, now they come from Egypt or Mexico, is it because of global warming that they don't grow here any more? Radishes 'from various source countries'; dare I ask in modern jargon what is their carbon footprint?

After leaving the Pannier Market I went to Mill Street via Grenville Street and the High Street, following a Morris dancing family. I may be wrong but I didn't see anything in Grenville Street that seemed appropriate to the day. However, Mill Street had attracted many suitably clothed individuals and the smell of roasting pork was irresistible. Business must have been brisk because not a portion had been served, but on my return, an hour and a half later, I was lucky to get anything at all. My consolation was being served by a very attractive young wench whose name, unfortunately, she refused to divulge.

It was a splendid and successful day to demonstrate Jubilee Square as a grown up playground with at least four teams of Morris dancers, their spirited performances greatly appreciated by many onlookers. However, in future something must be done to stop young and old pedal cyclists from invading the performing area and vans seemingly impervious to what is going on.

Being something of an historian, I wanted to see the sheep driven over the bridge in a symbolic gesture of how wool brought wealth into the town. Such were the crowds, larger than for the Round Britain Cycle Race, I could not get anywhere near these, by then, invisible sheep. All that could be seen was a 'wolf' in sheep's clothing but not the real thing. From some considerable distance I could see the Mayor and his colourful entourage and a Crusader in chain mail but that is all. In days gone by flocks would be driven over the bridge and up Bridge Street to a market just above the Pannier Market. Not really feasible today



The Sherlock Holmes School of Self-Defence! Huw Collingbourne reveals the martial art that defeated Moriarty.

"We tottered together upon the brink of the fall. I have some knowledge, however, of baritsu, or the Japanese system of wrestling, which has more than once been very useful to me. I slipped through his grip, and he with a horrible scream kicked madly for a few seconds and clawed the air with both his hands. But for all his efforts he could not get his balance, and over he went." This was how Sherlock Holmes described his fateful encounter with his arch-enemy Professor Moriarty at the Reichenbach Falls (described in the story, The Adventure of the Empty House). When I first read that story, many years ago, I assumed that the art of 'baritsu' was entirely fictional. It turns out, however, that it is not. What Holmes calls 'baritsu' is almost certainly a variant spelling of 'Bartitsu', a method of unarmed combat devised by Edward William Barton-Wright towards the end of the 19th Century.

Barton-Wright was an engineer by profession who studied jujitsu for some years while living in Japan and, on his return to London in 1898, he began teaching his own self-defence system. Bartitsu was a curious mix of judo, jujitsu, boxing, wrestling, fencing and French 'savate' (stickfighting). But Barton-Wright modified some of the traditional techniques by using decidedly non-traditional weapons such as walking sticks, overcoats and even bicycles.

It was at about this time, towards the end of Queen Victoria's reign, that Japanese martial arts began to become widely known in Britain. Several jujitsu clubs opened in London and they catered, principally, to gentlemen wishing to learn how to defend themselves against attack by ruffians from the lower orders. When Barton-Wright opened his Bartitsu Club in Shaftsbury Avenue in 1900 he too recruited members from the



From a modern perspective, it is tempting to dismiss Bartitsu as entirely ridiculous. These days most people probably think of martial arts as essentially ancient and unchanged throughout the centuries. In fact, that is far from the truth. Most of the martial arts practised today are quite modern. Both Judo and karate (in its current form) were developed in the late19th Century. The martial art which I teach, Aikido, is even more recent, having been created in the early 20th Century. Just like Bartitsu, Aikido was synthesised from a combination of several older martial arts - with influences ranging from jujitsu to Japanese sword and stick (*jo*) fighting. In fact, when I look at those old pictures of people doing Bartitsu I can easily identify techniques that still exist in Aikido. The main difference is that we don't, on the whole, wax our moustaches and wear straw boaters. In terms of sheer stylishness, then, Bartitsu takes the prize. I rather suspect that's why it appealed to Sherlock Holmes. (**Picture shows Edward Barton-Wright and various gentlemen doing "Bartitsu"**)

Family History.

Since 1801 there has been a census every 10 years. Generally, only those from 1841 have survived and only those from 1901 for Ireland. They record details for every resident person and are available up to and including the 1911 census. From 1851, each member of the household was required to provide their relationship to the head of household I.e. marital status, gender, age occupation and place of birth. Later returns include disability and employment details. The 1911 census also includes number of years married and number of children born and still living to married women. All the censuses can be obtained at all libraries and record offices. The next meeting of the North Devon Group of the Devon Family History Society will be on Saturday 18th Aug 2pm - 4pm at the Burton Art Museum, Bideford and is free to all to attend.

Burton Art Gallery

August is the month when we can look forward to the Annual Westward Ho! & Bideford Art Society Exhibition, now in its 90th year, and still going strong. Artists from all over the South West take part, with a great variety of artwork in all media. With such talent congregating in one special Gallery, , we are privileged to

have a whole month, from **18th August to the 16th September**, to enjoy it. This year 5 final-year, prize-winning art students from Petroc School of Art will join the display, and will receive cash prizes from the Society. It has always been the Society's wish to encourage the next generation's creativity. A further prize will be awarded to one work selected from the Show in memory of Ken Doughty, a past-President of the Society; If you wish to submit your work for selection for the Exhibition, the handing-in dates are **10th August**, **from 2.30 – 4.30 p.m.**, **and on the 11th August**, **from 10-11 a.m.** Pick up their leaflet from the racks in the Gallery foyer for more details.

There is a free 'Talk and Tour' at 2.00 p.m. on the 18th. *Clive Bowen and Svend Bayer's Ceramic Exhibition and the Gallery's collection of works by E.Aubrey Hunt stays until the 5th -*

The School holidays sometimes seem to stretch endlessly ahead when one has children to amuse, but the Burton comes to your aid with the Children's Summer Workshops at £15 per session.

Starting with 'Wacky Witch' on the 2nd, your child(ren) can make a 3D character and dress it; On the 7th August, 'Graffiti Wall' - build a landscape, by paper cutting and spray-painting; 'Cloth Treasure Map Game' takes place on 9th August; and this is a chance to invent a game, make the rules, and challenge the family and friends with a unique creation.

'Junk Modelling' on the 16th August, when boats are built out of scrap materials, oodles of glue, woody bits and card. The Dictator

is a ridiculous, satirical film which makes you laugh all the way through.

It was shown recently by Bideford Film Society as part of its summer programme.

The film tells the story of Admiral General Aladeen (Sacha Baron Cohen)

the dictator leader of the oil-rich desert state of Wadiya. He appears to be a mixture of Gaddafi and Saddam Hussein but Cohen plays him more with comedy than villainy.

The film is filled with jokes which the audience at Bideford College enjoyed with loud guffaws not quiet chuckles.

Aladeen visits New York to address the United Nations hoping to win international favour. A would-be usurper in the Wadiya government (Ben Kingsley) arranges an assassination attempt. He promises to bring "democracy" to Wadiya ,to sell oil rights to world leaders with a large fee for himself. A Treaty document is ready for signing. A dim-witted double replaces the

dictator, and the temporarily deposed Aladeen has his trade-mark beard forcibly shaved off. Presumed dead ,and unrecognised he's then protected by the feminist owner of an organic food shop. They fall in love and Aladeen realises the error of his ways. He forces entry into the U.N and tears up the "democracy" agreement.

He makes a speech in which he gives his true vision of democracy which he contrasts with current values in the U.S.A., China etc. The story is ridiculous and often crude. But it highlights the iniquities and inequalities of what we call democracy and freedom. And often a one-line joke can sum up the cruelties of life under some regimes. The satire is everywhere. Cohen is so cleverly stupid. He reminded me of the Two Ronnies "forkandles" sketch as, when asked his identity he reads out public notices with such a foreign accent that at first you think he's pronouncing his name. You Can Help in the Simplest Of Wavs.

It was only by chance that I saw a piece in the local press about Duncan Withall, his Olympic Torch and the Bideford Foodbank. Duncan was using his Olympic Torch as a publicity and fund raising opportunity for the Bideford Foodbank at Atlantic Village on Saturday, July 7th. The thought of people going hungry stirred up some unwelcome memories for me, those of being hungry. Living on National Assistance, as it was in the 50's, my mum struggled to pay the bills and put food on the table. She often sat and cried over it. We never actually starved but there was rarely enough to make you feel full and even today I wonder how she managed. You would think that this is a thing of the past but, as you read this now there will be families in Bideford and the local area who do not have any food to put on their table. The usual reaction to this with a lot of us is that it must be their own fault, they're a bunch of scroungers and probably spending their benefits on booze and fags. Whilst this might possibly be true of a very small minority, it is completely untrue for so many. What would any of us do if tomorrow we lost our job, became ill with no sick pay, have a breakdown or are abandoned by the main breadwinner? Benefits take time to kick in; what do you do in the meantime - little or no money and the cupboard is bare?

Bideford Foodbank is a new volunteer initiative that is being run from the distribution centre at 21 High Street. You can't just walk in and get food on demand. Non perishable food donated by the public is sorted and packed by volunteers. Frontline professionals such as doctors and social workers, having identified those in crisis, give out food vouchers which can then be exchanged for 3 days worth of food at the Foodbank. Volunteers there will also take time to listen and signpost people on to additional means of help and support. What can you do? The population figure for Torridge is one of 65,800 at the last count, a very large proportion of which is over 16. If everyone who can, donated just one tin or packet of food it would keep the Foodbank going for a long time. Could you donate a few hours of your time to help? Run a sponsored event? Have a "Just One" event at work where everyone brings in just one item [or more if possible] – no strain on the purse or the larder. Go with a friend and help, you'll make new friends as well and you will be supporting your local community.

The problem is a lot of people will read this, think they will donate something or do something then forget about it. Please don't! It only takes a moment to stroll up the High Street and drop off a donation or offer to help. We all have those tins and packets at the back of the

cupboard we rarely use, dig them out, dust them off, check the sell by date and help

someone less fortunate than yourself. It will help them, make you feel good and the walk up the High Street will keep you fit. Do it today – make the effort and together we can prevent other mums, dads and children having potent and distressing memories of being hungry!

PC Rowlands from the Police Neighbourhood Team dealt with this matter and says. "The message to anyone thinking of helping themselves to chippings from a lay-by is that they do belong to someone and to take them is a criminal act of theft. If you are caught this could mean a day in court and a criminal record. We would also ask that if anyone sees such activity they report it to us immediately by calling 101. "

The Police and Highways ask that the public remain vigilant around such Lay-by landings. It is not just the occasional bag, on occasions tons have been loaded into trailers by plant equipment. If you see anything suspicious, whether it is a few bags or a tractor and trailer loading chippings, please call the police immediately on 101.
