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Bideford Heritage Trail – Revisited.

There is now an excellent new Heritage Trail guide produced by Bideford 500 with loads of information about Bideford. Even so Roger Sugar has found yet more additions to the guide which he has listed here:-

The Early History section. Locally the last ice age ended about 14,000 BC and the stone tools from 12,000 BC, found during the excavations for the New Bridge, are exhibited in the Burton Gallery. Nor is there any mention of the Romans who built a marching camp overlooking the town or of Julius Caesar who called the locals Dumnonii, Devon Dumplings or perhaps simply Devonians.

The Old Quay. There is a record of a thirty foot high pile of horse manure on the quay collapsing and entombing a local man. On another occasion a horse apparently went mad and galloped off the quay taking a local bus and five passengers to their untimely death in the river.

The Rose of Torridge, alias the Newfoundland Hotel was built 27 years after Richard Grenville's death. However, the mention of fishing the New Newfoundland Banks is appropriate because a contract between a Northam fisherman and a Barnstaple merchant was recorded in 1542. In 1835 Captain James Yeo of Appledore stated "cod were so dense men could not make progress by rowing"; now they are an endangered species.

The Long Bridge. When aged 16 John Strange, hero of the black death, was accosted by a ruffian and thrown off the Long Bridge. Recently a cyclist on the pavement bounced off my chest and threatened to break both my arms and legs if I didn't get out of his way. A deja vu moment perhaps.

Tome Stone! Not so, this is a myth. I quote from W. H. Rogers book on Buckland Brewer. "The Church was again struck by lightning in 1769 which threw down one of the pinnacles of the tower and wrecked the chancel, nave and south aisle. . . To save expense the three other pinnacles were removed, and according to local tradition two were converted into stone rollers, while the third was bought by a Bideford tradesman and built into the wall of his shop at the corner of the High Street, where it can be seen at the present day, to serve as a kerb stone much in the same way as the old Celtic cross from the Exe Bridge was placed at the corner of Gandy Street to keep carts off the tradesman's shop".

Bridge Street circa 1880 was composed of a flight of steps until some unfortunate man fell down them and died. Whereupon the Town Council filled them in and that is why some houses are partly below road level and rails prevent unwary pedestrians from having a nasty fall.

The Town Hall. It is probably still a state secret but under the town Hall there is, or was, a shelter for the Town Council in case of atomic attack. At the time of the greatest threat an Army Major came to lecture the Council on precautions and what to do in the aftermath. His advice was to buy lots of brooms and sweep all the radio active debris into the river. What would the ecologists say?

The Plague in Bideford. In late May 1646 three young sons of a local surgeon called Revening played on a shipload of merino wool from Spain. A few days later they sickened and died, becoming Bideford's first victims of the plague which lasted from June 8th 1646 until the 18th of June 1647. "In a few weeks the houses were full of horror and the streets became covered in grass".

Tower Street buildings are interesting and some tributes to the bricklayers art. However, what I find even more interesting are the steps and paving, a mixture of cobbles and slabs of slate, surely this must be the most representative Bideford of yesteryear.

Buttgarden Street. Was this where the local archers kept their buts/targets for practice and that is why it is so straight, I would like to think. Other minds think it is derived from the Old English *but* meaning outside, the gardens [outside of town] or without. But no one can dispute that *but* in 1345 meant 'mark for target practice'.

Jubilee Square. Not so very long ago a boat maker on Jubilee Square built small vessels on a form of trolley or mobile platform. When it was time to launch the platform was wheeled to the quay edge and by pulling ropes the vessel was catapulted out onto the river.

News from the Burton Art Gallery & Museum

September already, but although the year is sliding quietly by, you may be able to forget *tempus fugit*, and take the opportunity to view the great variety of artwork presented by the Westward Ho! & Bideford Art Society's 90th Annual Open Exhibition. What a treat this is! Every year without fail this Society attracts artists from all over our region. The Society was founded in 1922, and for many years artists worked and held their exhibitions on the top floor of Bideford's Bridge Buildings – Sheila Hutchinson, a founder member, recalled heaving her easel and framed paintings up 72 wearisome stone stairs – so imagine their relief when they were offered the Burton Gallery – no steps! - for their exhibitions by Thomas Burton, when he gave his gallery to the town in 1951 in memory of his daughter, Mary. The current exhibition continues until **16th September**, and as many items are for sale, this is an ideal opportunity to purchase original works of art. From **22nd September**, **Nigel Hall's Exhibition – 'In Transit'** – takes over. On loan from London's Royal Academy, these works are part of their Artists' Laboratories exhibition programme. Drawings and small scale sculpture add to the variety of work on show. The exhibition continues until 29th October. An appreciation takes place on 22nd September at 2pm, with Nigel Hall himself.

At the end of the month, the Gallery presents: 'Illustrations from the Archives' of Leonard Baskin. one of the most significant artists of the 20th century. Sculptor, writer and illustrator, watercolour artist and print-maker, he was born in America, but spent 9 years in Lurley, near Tiverton, and became a friend of Ted Hughes, and the pair collaborated their talents. Selected illustrations have been chosen by Warren Collum, the Gallery's Exhibition & Collections Officer, from the Heritage Collections Department at Exeter University. Join a free Talk and Tour by Dominic Jinks, Arts & Culture Manager at Exeter University, on 29th September, at 2pm.

You can **Explore Oils** with professional artist, **Tony Williams**, on 8th September from 10am to 4pm. Fee £30. Pick up more details from the Gallery, and book on 01237 471455.

The **Cafe du Parc** welcomes Deja Blue Jazz Duo on 2nd September for a Jazz lunch from 1-3pm. Don't forget – the Cafe is open from 6-9pm on the first Friday of September, so that you can dine in style on (hopefully) a balmy summer evening!

Jeremy Thorpe

This month the Torridge branch of Parkinson's UK talks about one of its famous members.

Last month we heard that Jeremy Thorpe is leaving North Devon and his cottage at Cobbaton is up for sale.

Back in the 1970s Jeremy Thorpe was a very well known and highly respected local figure as well as being MP for Devon North, as it was then, and head of the Liberal Party. From 1967 to 1976, he turned the Liberals from a party small enough to fit in a taxi (six MPs) into a party small enough to fit in a minibus (eleven)

Then in 1979 things went very wrong, with a court case and an accusation of murder. The charges against him were eventually dropped, but he never regained his former reputation and lost his seat in Parliament . Shortly afterwards he was found to be suffering from Parkinson's Disease , an illness which he has lived with for thirty years. He did however retain an interest in Politics becoming President of the North Devon Liberal, later Liberal Democrat, Association, and saw his old seat regained by Nick Harvey. In 1997 he attended the Liberal Democrat conference and received a standing ovation.

The following is taken from a Guardian article by Allegra Stretton in 2008 'When the former Liberal party leader Jeremy Thorpe needs attention, he presses the buzzer hanging from his neck and Disney's 'It's a Small World After All' rings round his large Regency house in Notting Hill. If it could be heard in Westminster (it would imply) that he wants the government to fast-forward all attempts to cure Parkinson's disease, '"The saliva and shakes make me seem gaga."

'On a national level, Parkinson's UK is still the largest charity funder of Parkinson's research in the UK. Major advances have come from research that they have funded, and these have helped to improve treatment and care for people living with Parkinson's, both within the UK and worldwide. So far, more than £55million has been invested in ground-breaking Parkinson's research. And on a local level, the Torridge Branch continues to offer support and fellowship to over 60 people with Parkinson's, plus their families and carers." (John Wilson Chair of local group)

Coffee mornings are held monthly at Ethelwynne Brown Common Room (10.30am on the first Wednesday of the month) and there is a regular Keep Fit Class at Weare Giffard and a Carers' support group. Keep Safe On The Street!

As the nights are drawing in, many people – men as well as women – may feel increasingly concerned about their safety when walking alone on the streets after dark.

In this article, I shall consider the risks you may face and how you can minimise them. First of all, let me make it clear that I am not even going to attempt to explain how to defend yourself against an attack. Having studied and taught a martial art for many years it is my opinion that there is no quick way to learn effective self-defence skills.

Instead, I want to address two questions: 1) What is the risk of being the victim of an unprovoked attack and 2) how can you minimise that risk?

How To Minimise The Risk

There are a few simple measures you can take to reduce any risk to yourself. These include keeping to well-lit areas and avoid displaying value items (such iPhones, jewellery or cash). If you find yourself in trouble, it is generally safer to run away than to confront the aggressor. If this is not possible, police advice is to make as much noise as possible by shouting for help.

How Much Risk Is There?

The good news is that Devon and Cornwall are among the safest places in the UK. You can check the number of incidents of crime in your locality by entering your post code into the crime-search web site at: www.police.uk.

I contacted Devon and Cornwall Police to ask for information on the number of unprovoked attacks on people in the area. They told me that such an attack is "extremely unlikely" and the risk is "miniscule". Even the statistics shown on the Police UK web site may seem to over-state the risk since "the majority of victims are either known to the offender or have sought to intervene in a situation they have witnessed and are attacked as a result."

For more advice, go to http://www.devon-cornwall.police.uk/CrimePrevention/PersonalSafety/ and select topics such as 'Be streetwise' from the drop down menu at the bottom of the page. There is also guidance on avoiding and reporting crime on the Home Office's Crime site: http://www.homeoffice.gov.uk/crime/.

But, while the risks of being attacked by a stranger in North Devon are very small, we all face significant risks of injury on a daily basis – next month I'll explain what these are and what you can do to avoid them.

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
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

Bideford College - A student's viewpoint..

I started Bideford College in Year 7, last September and thought I would share some of my experiences with you as it might be of interest for those students starting this month. I attended St Helen's primary school in Abbotsham which is a relatively small village school. In the July before starting secondary school, every prospective student of Bideford College was offered two "taster days" to prepare them and give them the chance to meet their tutor group and their tutor. These two days were a great way to start to find your way around the school. Although it is massive, it is very easy to find your way around as the levels and buildings are easily numbered and colour coded. (You soon get the hang of it).

The new term soon arrived and all new students went into tutor groups where they were issued with but my friend Millie and I managed to get them in yearly planners; these help to ensure homework, achievement, big events and detentions are all noted down. Teachers award postcards and yellow slips for good effort and achievement. Certificates are also awarded during assembly when a certain number of postcards are achieved.

On the other hand, if a student fails to do homework or disrupts a lesson, they are given a detention, sent outside the classroom or sent to withdrawal.

Lessons are planned over a fortnight and the days always go quickly. There is a reasonable amount of homework which is often done online via the special school website. Students are put into sets depending on ability in English, Maths and Science in Year 7.

Bideford College is quite strict as far as uniform is concerned. You must have black, red or white coats, although black is the predominant colour. Shoes must be black with no logos and trainers are not allowed.

The sports' facilities at Bideford College are out of this world. During lunchtime there are a multitude of sports clubs that you can attend: athletics, tennis, football, cricket, rounders, hockey, netball, etc. If you attend them you'll find that you get the chance to play in loads of matches and tournaments and you even get to go on trips. For example I attended tennis club and had the opportunity to go to Wimbledon on the Number one court this summer. which was an amazing experience!!! Another great thing is that you get recognised for your efforts with certificates and colours. Colours are special material badges that you sew onto your uniform, when you show great talent and/or really good effort. Not many of these are given out in Year 7,

Even if you are not sporty there are still clubs that you can enjoy, like the drama club, choir or library club. You get the chance to win prizes for writing good book reviews and each term, the tutor group which reads the most books in each year group, receives a tin of chocolates.

Life at Bideford College is great, and although the prospect of starting secondary school may be daunting, all staff in Bideford College will make it so much easier for you and you will make many new friends! You will be amazed by the greatness of Bideford College - enjoy it while you are there!

Bideford Film Society - Fast Girls:

It's the Olympic year, so there is never a better time to release a sport based film. 'Fast Girls' is a fast paced yarn which recounts the rivalry between two girls from fundamentally different backgrounds in their guest for glory. It is a British film set in London, and one that you can easily relate to. Although this film is based on the World Championships, it has a very definite link to the Olympics. It is an inspirational film and it made me want to jump to my feet running! Fast Girls follows two young female track rivals as they train for the World Athletics Championships in London. Shania is a natural athlete struggling to break free from a life of 'council block' despair. She finds herself on the same relay team as the annoyingly middle-class and snobbish Lisa, whose father has a strong say on her club's decisions. Somewhat predictably, the girls dislike each other, incessantly arguing and fighting over the course of the training. Eventually they become firm friends as Shania supports Lisa in finally standing up to her father's overpowering ways, and go on to win a gold medal in the relay!

One of the more exciting parts of the story was when our relay team verbally outmanoeuvred a group of drunk boys, then outrunning them when they realised they were in trouble. It was hilarious and hugely satisfying to see the usually

The Future of Our Churches and Churchyards.

North Devon's historic churches, many dating back to the 14th and 15th centuries, are part of the landscape. Their tall towers and spires can be seen crowning the hill tops of Torridgeside and they are a characteristic feature of our town and village streets. The churches and their gravestones are an essential link with the past and a record of the history of local families.

Fewer people are churchgoers these days and, consequently, less money can be raised for maintenance. In the near future, without the help of local communities, many of these churches and chapels could fall into disrepair or be sold off for conversion to other uses or for demolition and building. There is a limit to the



number that can be preserved as historical monuments. One answer is for the building itself to become a centre both for religious life and for a whole variety of community activities; in fact, public concerts are already a regular feature in many churches.

Communities in this area are coming together to help in the management of churchyards. In Littleham, both churchgoers and non-churchgoers have a rota to keep the grass mown and an attempt is being made to encourage the growth of wild flowers. The villagers of Weare Gifford have made great strides in combining less frequently mown areas, where grasses and wild flowers thrive, with parts of the churchyard which are mown more often.

St Margaret's Church, Northam, is faced with a shortage of money to pay the bill for keeping its very large churchyard closely mown. A group of Northam people are helping to manage it in such a way that access will be provided to the graves; paths and the area around the church will be mown more often; and other areas will have an annual cut in order to allow wild flowers to establish, together with insects, birds, slow-worms and other wildlife. Volunteers will be needed to clear the grass after cutting and to control more invasive plants, such as bramble. The aim is for the churchyard to be a quiet, attractive place for villagers to walk and sit, a haven for wildlife and to continue to act as St Margaret's burial ground.
