



Port of Bideford Stone

Situated at the end of the Pill on the corner opposite the Kingsley Statue is a stone which commemorates the restoration of the status of the title Port to the town in 1928. The following is an explanation of the symbolic meaning of the stone in relation to the ship's prow on it and will doubtless be of interest (From Bideford Gazette June 11th 1929 – sent to us by Mike Davy)

1. The ship represents the town of Bideford.

The ship is one of the old 'Wooden Walls of England,' thus paying tribute to the ancient shipbuilding industry of Bideford and the gallant men who sailed in those ships and spread



- The plain background from which the ship emerges typifies the mists of antiquity in which Bideford had its birth
- The ship is sailing right into the unknown Sea of Destiny not drifting aimlessly or 'out of control.
- The anchors have been stowed away. The ship is on a voyage to Greater Prosperity, not looking for some backwater in which to drop anchor and lie up and rot.
- Though the gunports are open, the guns are drawn in signifying that while we desire peace we can and will protect the fair fame of our town and country.
- There is no watch in the bows which denotes that the ship's company have every reliance in the pilot on duty at the helm – His Worship the Mayor.

(The Port Memorial is currently being transferred to the Town Council from TDC. The monument itself does not really justify the fine words of the author of this article, so perhaps this is an opportunity for a new one which better reflects our heritage.Ed) ****************************

Now held annually in March, the ceremony was originally for townspeople to bring issues before the Lords of the Manor.



Nowadays, ideas or "presentments" are considered by a jury of 12 town residents and the most feasible are presented at Manor Court for the Town Council to consider. The ceremony also includes a presentation and is followed by a reception. 
Feel Better with a Book.

'Night Music' by JoJo Moyes, discussed by Bideford Library Readers' group.

Few in the group had previously read anything by this prolific author who has had eleven books published since 2008. Eight of the ten of us enjoyed this story and were keen to read more by this author. This tale about how a family, recovering from the loss of the husband/father, adapt to living in the semi-derelict 'Spanish House'. After a sheltered life in London they have to cope without many of the accompaniments of modern life – they have no fridge, no bathroom and no money. The close knit village has its own 'standards' and some inhabitants are helpful, whilst others, particularly local builder, Matt, certainly aren't. Some felt that Matt came over as 'too horrible to be true', almost as a cartoon villain.

The mother, Isabel, is a musician who plays her violin, often at night, for solace, as an escape from everyday life. She loses herself in the playing to avoid having to deal with reality. Much of the family's decision making initially falls to fifteen year old Kitty whilst the younger brother hasn't come to terms with the death of his father a year previously. However, all three family members change as the story unfolds.

Themes of the story include obsession, dealing with change, possession and loss and how these are dealt with in different ways.

The group found a few discrepancies in the story line but these didn't detract from what most agreed was a good read, ideal to take on the beach, to bed or on a journey – just a read to be enjoyed. It was fairly undemanding, certainly not life-changing, but, as one member described, 'a rollicking good read'. Another described it as 'a tale full of satisfying mythologies which make it suitable for a holiday read.'

It stimulated discussion on other books where 'a house' was central to the story and 'Howard's End' by E.M. Forster and 'Rebecca' by Daphne du Maurier were mentioned while it was suggested that 'Music and Silence' by Rose Tremain gives an insight into the ties between a musician and the music he/she plays.

Flood of evidence for Climate Change

The signs of climate change happening have been clear to some for many years now, others still seem to be able to avoid seeing the obvious. Even though all the statistical models built by the world's most prestigious academic centres fail to predict current trends in the climate without including human influence, there are many who still refuse to accept the overwhelming evidence. The winter storms and flooding are far more typical of an altered climate than they are of one unaffected by mankind. The warming influence of Greenhouse gasses, the most common being Carbon Dioxide (CO2), result in much higher levels of evaporation at the equator and so the air just carries more water to drop upon us. Higher levels of precipitation are not the only cause of flooding, but manmade climate change makes heavier, longer periods of rain much more frequent. Some climate sceptics have argued that the global surface temperatures have stabilised in recent years, and therefore manmade climate change does not exist. This would be a reasonable argument, but for 3 key important facts that they fail to mention – that is even if they know what they are.

- □ We are currently near the solar minima i.e. the energy from the sun is near the bottom of its short cycle of 11 years and almost certain to be near to the long cycle minimum that occurs approximately every 100 years give or take 10. These impacts have been massive in the past causing the mini ice age of the middle ages, we haven't seen an ice age because greenhouse gases have more than offset the cooling impact of less sunlight.
- Deep Sea temperatures have risen sharply, even while the temperature of the shallow waters has remained more or less stable over the last decade. There is increasing evidence that more heat than expected is being sub-ducted into the deep oceans making sea level rise higher than initially thought, not so good for those living next to Northam Burrows.
- □ Higher wind speeds near the equator have cooled the region by increasing the rate of evaporation from tropical seas. The greater power of weather systems starting in the tropics results in tropical storms, the seeds of winter storms in Britain, starting stronger. So while tropical waters are cooled by 0.1 -0.2 C, and the global mean temperatures are held back, the winter storms we have to prepare for are much stronger than in the past.

Climate change caused by manmade factors is rightly very frightening. The last time the climate changed at anywhere near this rate was 55 million years ago, when the temperature rose 6 C over 20,000 years and resulted in over 90% of species in that period becoming extinct. Based on the best science there is available the human race is due to cause 4-6 C increase in temperatures in less than 100 years. The rate of extinction could easily exceed 99% as only bacteria and viruses can adapt to changes in their environment so quickly.

Food News

Felicity's Fish Cookery through the seasons

There is a new opportunity for people of all ages in Bideford and surrounding villages to learn more about preparing ,cooking and tasting the great range of local fish caught through the seasons.

Petroc College is running courses at Bideford College and demonstrations in the Pannier Market and at events in the surrounding areas throughout 2014 (see also Burton News on page 11). The project called "Tipping the scales" started on the 27th February and I will be running my second session at Bideford College called "Spring into Healthy fish" on 27th March 6.30-9.00pm.



The healthy recipes that you can try at the March course will include some from Jack Munro, a new cook who has some great seasonal fish recipes for you to try.

Devonshire Fish Pie- An old traditional recipes combining smoked winter fish with eggs

1 small Finnan haddock and or 1 fillet Smoked Pollack/Whiting with skin removed 4g/1oz grated parmesan or cheddar cheese, grated.

1 teaspoon chopped parsley

2 eggs

4g/1oz homemade breadcrumbs

Tabasco sauce and tomatoes puree

- 1. Boil Finnan Haddock for7 minutes, cool and separate bones and skin, or poach smoked Pollack fillet. Cool. Separate into flakes with a fork.
- 2. Place flaked fish in mixing bowl and add tomato puree, drops of tabasco sauce to taste and chopped parsley.
- 3. Beat the eggs and add to fish with black pepper.
- 4. Put in a well greased casserole dish and sprinkle the breadcrumbs and cheese on top with a dab of butter .
- 5. Bake for about 25mins in oven 200C or gas mark 6 or centre of Rayburn/Aga!

And pancakes!

Join in the celebration of a wonderfully unique tradition at Clovelly for Shrove Tuesday on **4**th **March.** 'Lentsherd'(pronounced "Lanshard") is said to rid Clovelly of all the bad things from the previous year, chasing bad spirits away and banishing the Devil into the sea with a perfect riot before Lent begins.

Tin cans (and just about anything else that makes a suitable racket) are tied to strings and dragged down the famous cobbled street, right to the end of the harbour wall. There, the strings are tied together and the metal objects are thrown into the sea; it is said to take the evil spirits with them. Having served their purpose the cans are retrieved from the water and recycled!

The ancient custom has recently evolved to include tags bearing the names of children from all over the world which are sent via the 'Clovelly Village' Facebook and Twitter pages. The tags are tied to a string of tin cans, then dragged down the cobbles on their behalf!

Children, accompanied by an adult, are invited to meet at 4:45 p.m. for a 5:00 p.m. start at the Victoria Fountain on the cobbles, bringing with them tin cans tied to string. There will be free entry for visitors to Clovelly after 4:30 p.m. The custom is most certainly not a race and all participants are encouraged to head safely down the cobbled street at a pace that suits them.

Following the riotous fun, delicious pancakes will be available for all to buy at The Red Lion. Each participating child will receive one free pancake from the Red Lion and will be able to decorate them with various toppings and sprinkles.

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
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News from the Burton Art Gallery & Museum

If you haven't yet managed to visit the Gallery and see the **Children's Annual Exhibition**, make it a priority. The talent for art and craft within our area is, without question, some of the best you will find anywhere. The exhibition ends on 10th March, don't miss it

'Pots, Fish and Ships' is the title of an exhibition which continues until 24th March. Potters were invited to show any work inspired by North Devon's historic trade with North America. Hundreds of cargoes of slipware from our potteries at



Felicity (see page 9) will be giving a fish cookery demonstration on **Thursday 20th March from 10.30-12.45 pm** so this will be a drop in with talks at **10.30**, **11.00**, **11.30 and 12.00 noon**. The fish recipes will be made with Salt Cod that is traditionally sold around Easter. There will be free tastings and a selection of simple recipes to keep.

There is a new addition to the Museum, recently launched by Bideford's Mayor, Simon Inch, to celebrate another piece of Bideford's history. This is Bideford Black a very soft coal, not suitable for burning, but an excellent pigment for painting the bottom of boats, and in the 20th century, used for eye-makeup and kohl pencils, and was sent all round the world. Artists have found it an interesting media for painting, and local school children have had a lot of fun making patterns and pictures with it at the Saturday Workshops.So now 'Biddiblack', as it was known locally, has its own display cabinet, complete with video and audio information, maps and photographs, not to mention a shovel and a pickaxe. Funding came partly from the legacy of Miss Peggy Lines, (late Friend of the Burton) and partly from the Heritage Lottery Fund. You will find this display in the Museum on the first floor of the Gallery, it's well worth a visit.

100 Years ago

Not much seems to have changed with the weather over the past 100 years. On Sunday 15th March 1914 a heavy gale passed over the region. Vessels in both Appledore and Bideford, although double moored, were swamped and one barge had a mast carried away. The Burrows were under water and the river Torridge was a mass of waves and seething foam. The slipway at the Royal George in Appledore was washed away as well as a large portion of the roadway.

The Blacksmith's Arms at East-the-Water was sold for £800 at an auction to Messrs S W Arnold & Sons. Ivydean in Abbotsham Road was for sale and also Roborough House (formerly 1 Westcroft Terrace) – both from Bazeley Barnes and Bazeley.

On the front page of the Gazette were adverts for J Sanguine & Sons in Grenville Street who were holding their annual sale of boots and shoes – strictly cash only. William C Talbot in the High Street recommended Oatmeal stout for invalids and persons of a weak digestion - price 2/6d for twelve one pint bottles. Walter H Chope proudly advertised Warner's Rust proof corsets!

Nothing much seems to have changed in other areas as well – the reservoirs were overflowing due to increased rainfall and Bideford Council had received several complaints about the state of Alverdiscott Road due to lorries hauling timber away from Webbery. A manhole collapsed outside Queens Anne's Buildings in the High Street precipitating a young lady into the coal cellar below. Fortunately she was unhurt.

Bideford Hospital (privately run – no NHS) held its Annual General Meeting where it was reported that 639 cases were treated during the year, of these 269 were operations requiring overnight admission. The daily cost of food to these patients was 6.44d per head – about 2½p in today's values.

THE BLACK DEATH – if it didn't get you great days were coming

In 1348 the Black Death arrived in England. It isn't clear exactly where it landed, some reports pinpoint Bristol others Dorset, but no matter where it arrived it swept through the country at lightning speed with fatal and far reaching consequences.

It may have been brought to Bideford by a travelling pedlar or by someone from the town who visited an infected area or more likely it arrived by sea. Ships from Bideford would have been fishing and trading in the Bristol Channel and Celtic Sea and some would have been in contact with people from infected areas. The contact would have infected crews who would then have taken the disease to the town.

People would have known that the "Pestilence" was incurable, indiscriminate and struck rich and poor, young and old, men women and children. So when they knew that it was in the town panic would have spread.

Seeking a place of sanctuary people flocked to St Mary's to pray for mercy and protection. Others believing that it was the start of the Apocalypse, or the end of time, saw each day as their last, abandoning moral and sexual codes, others turned to public acts of penitence. The mass loss of partners led to a boom in the marriage market!

The Black Death raged for a little over two years and records show that it killed almost 40% of the population, the country's worst ever demographic disaster. By 1351 Bideford's population would have been a few hundred. Some villages and hamlets around the town would have been deserted, some lost forever It led to a saying common at the time that "there's hardly enough living to bury the dead".

The effects of the Black Death were devastating, the biggest social groups lost the most people, these were the craftsmen, labourers and the peasantry. The greatly reduced labour force meant that the very nature of the economy had to change. The massive shortage of craftsmen, labourers and peasants to work the fields led to an immediate rise in wages and the workers took full advantage.

Workers found that they had more employment opportunities with higher wages so they began to move to where they could command the best wages. Society became more mobile.

In the fields around Bideford there was not enough labour to work the land, landlords lost the rents from abandoned farms, the price of land fell and peasants earned higher wages. Labour intensive arable farming gave way to stock rearing and sheep were soon seen in most of the fields around the Torridge. At the same time the now better off peasants began to buy land, the "Yeoman" had arrived. Trading in wool soon began to be important for Bideford and wool traders, some of them ex-peasants, began to prosper. Bideford's first boom was underway!

In 1351 the Government passed the Labourers' Act in an attempt to bring wages back to preplague levels. Employers chasing the reduced workforce ignored the Act and continued to offer higher wages; some began to offer other inducements such as accommodation and food. Craftsmen, labours and peasants had never had it so good; the good times lasted for 100years
