Local fishing is busy this month. All the pots are out to catch lobsters and crabs and other shellfish. The trawlers and the rod and net fishing can now rely on more favourable weather. They will be landing a wonderful range of fish - Skate, Plaice, Gurnard, Mackerel and Bass, to name a few!

During the summer there are some additional places to buy local fish.

In Bideford, fish man Dan the Fishman has a regular stall every Friday in Mill Street and at the Farmers' Market every other Saturday on Bideford Quay. In Appledore there will be local fish stalls on Friday 25th July as part of the Appledore Summer Festival. Stalls will sell local caught fish and shellfish and a Kipper stall will have a range of Kipper products made from Clovelly - Herrings and more!

You can eat delicious local Crab sandwiches at the new Appledore Cabin on the Quay. Felicity will be running Shellfish demonstrations in Appledore, St Mary's Church Hall on Tuesday 3rd July 10.00-1.00pm as part of the Petroc College "Tipping the Scales" FLAG supported programme and similar free sessions on Saturday morning 26th July as part of the Appledore Summer Festival. There are about 2.5 million adults in the UK who cannot read or who have very poor literacy skills. Read Easy addresses this by giving lives back to people in one-to-one coaching sessions. The sessions are always in neutral venues, never in homes for safeguarding of both the Coach and Reader. The Read Easy Coach is never judgemental – just wants to help the person learn to read!

The get-together is based on two ½ sessions a week on a regular timetabled basis using the phonics-based book 'Yes We Can Read'. Read Easy in the Torridge area is just starting. We have several kind people who have already offered themselves as Coaches.

### It Could Be You

Being judgemental (and therefore wrongly assuming that I am superior to another human being), is one of my many faults, and the one I find hardest to keep in check. So occasionally I find a metaphorical 'mirror' is being held up to me and I find myself feeling misunderstood or undervalued.

How many of us admit to ourselves that we judge people we encounter by their dress, speech, physical appearance or communication difficulties. Money or work stress, psychological trauma or sometimes just downright bad luck can topple anyone. Then they need someone to see the real them, to listen (really listen without judgement), perhaps empathise if not sympathise, and encourage their self esteem back onto an upward path. (I am lucky to have such people). It requires wisdom and imagination, and a desire to try to understand, rather than instantly mentally categorising others to suit our opinion or ego.

We cannot know their situation unless we live every minute of every day walking alongside them, an obvious impossibility, but we can honour them by replacing judgement and superiority with humility and compassion. I'm still working on it!

Some of us even recalled the wonderful film of 'Mrs. Palfrey at the Claremont' with Joan Plowright and Rupert Friend so anticipated a novel of loneliness, anguish and despair, a theme generally to be had throughout Taylor's writings. Taylor provides us with an epic tale of domesticity spanning three generations: Grandmother, the former suffragette; Harriet, the dreamer; Betsy, the child on the brink of adulthood. The catalyst for the 'Game of Hide and Seek' is the teenage awakening between Harriet and Vesey, a flighty and callous youth. These emotions are reignited in their middle age when Vesey, having failed at Oxford, arrives to enjoy the pleasure and relaxation of listening with a provincial production of 'Hamlet'. Vesey appears malign but never exerts himself enough and sharing responses with others. No pressure to be effective while Harriet informs one of Taylor's favourite themes- a woman deformed by the sheer force of will required to assert

The secondary characters throughout provide us Every Thursday from 2pm with wit, compassion and hope.

The Reading Group was divided in its opinion as to whether the book might be an updated version of Jane Austen's Persuasion or an earlier version of Desperate Housewives. ### Gas guzzler or light entertainment?

Most of us are familiar with the sight of Anton, well known Bideford hairdresser, driving his huge Californian yellow truck through the streets. It is a miracle of driving just to survive the narrow streets and lack of large enough parking spaces; even getting in and out of it looks scarily dangerous. However all of us who know Anton have always felt sure that he will never be parted from his beloved truck.

So it was with some disbelief that I received the news a few weeks ago that he was selling the monster truck and buying, shock horror, a Toyota Aygo. A car, he told me with some pride that does 60miles to the gallon and is taxed for £20 a year.

I asked Anton to explain the difference between the two vehicles and the facts make interesting reading.

The Truck costs £225 a year to tax and does 18 - 20 to the gallon. On the other hand it has limited use, will never go on a motorway for example and only does a mileage of 2,800 a year compared to an average 10,000 for most people.

Insurance is less than for the Aygo, because the limited mileage guarantees him a special insurance rate, so he pays £250 as opposed to £350 for the Aygo.

In terms of carbon emissions the truck has to pass California's stringent requirements, so it may do better, or at least as well on the carbon emissions test, than the Aygo.

So there you have it. The truck is a fun vehicle which is not necessarily any better or worse for the environment than a much smaller car. However in terms of convenience the Aygo wins every time. (except in the snow maybe, or if I want to impress my grandchildren)

### **News from the Burton Art Gallery and Museum.**

Once again, in fact, for the 92<sup>nd</sup> time, the <u>Westward Ho! & Bideford Art Society</u> annual exhibition is in full swing at the Burton. And what a plethora of art works are on show! Wood engravings by Hilary Paynter, humorous wood-carvings by John Butler, pastels by Marianne Edwards, ceramics by Nick Juniper, textiles by Rachel Sumner and Penny Laird – I could go on



forever naming artists and their special media. There is such a variety of beautiful objects, and whatever your taste, you will find a piece of work to admire. The Society embraces abstract and quirky, the familiar and the modern; you will find spectacular photography of rocks and caves along our coast; the sea and ships feature large, and artists revelling in rolling landscape and sun-speckled woodland. Ceramics in every form abound – platters, intricate figurines, smooth-skinned vases and jugs; and then there is one shimmering bowl of clear perspex leaves. The exhibition ends on 13th July. Don't miss it.

To follow, the <u>Society of Wood Engravers</u> take their bow, with their 76<sup>th</sup> annual exhibition, beginning on 26<sup>th</sup> July, and continuing until the 15<sup>th</sup> September. You can enjoy a free 'Talk and Tour' with Society Member and Artist, Hilary Paynter, on the 26<sup>th</sup>, at 2.00 p.m.

This exhibition has been on tour, and the Burton is its 7<sup>th</sup> and final host. There are 150 pieces of work, drawn from artists across the U.K., the U.S.A., Canada and Europe, with a special selection of relief prints from Japan. North Devon artists include Hilary Paynter, Shirley Smith, Merlyn Chesterman and Edward Crumpton. All the works you will see have been selected on merit from a membership of around 70, and when you consider the craft of wood engraving, how detailed and meticulous an artist has to be to produce such fine work, you will be full of admiration. If you would like a day out – how about a coach trip to see the National Trust property at Kingswear, Coleton Fishacre? Built by the D'Oyly Carte family, it's Art Deco all over, and has a beautiful garden leading down to the spectacular cliffs below. 

**100 Years ago July 1914** (Bideford Community Archive at the Council offices, Windmill Lane, Northam. Tel: 01237 471714)

This was one of the first photographs ever to be published in the Bideford Gazette. Elderly Bideford Resident died at 95 years of age. Mrs Elizabeth Colwill, for many years resident in East-the –Water and daughter of William Lake retained all her faculties after a strenuous life. Last year she accomplished unaccompanied the railway journey from Bideford to Plymouth to visit her daughter.


#### **Abbotsham Racecourse**

Two of the other commandos were killed in the Sicily Landings, in 1943. I haven't been able to trace the others, not knowing the full names of two of them.

I must thank you very much Mrs Reed for all the hospitality and kindness you showed towards me, at my short stay, and when this war is over I hope to be able to come around to Appledore, (as it's only twenty five miles from my home,) and try and repay you, or at least show my appreciation to you, in helping to make these dark days of war 'bright' and I only wish that everywhere we go is as bright and cheerful as 18 Bude St. When I was with you 'Mrs Reed' I left behind a ration cover, can you remember, the one we thought was'nt any good, well it seems as though I have to have it here or else go without my ration of meat. Now if you can find it would you please send it on to me, and I shall be very grateful as my landlady here is rather worrying about it.

I will say Cheerio! now, and give my kind regards to all in No 18, and thank you again. Your Sincere Friend Victor.
