# THE NORTH DEVON MARITIME MUSEUM IS FOR EVERYONE 

## Come and discover for yourself the North Devon Maritime Museum in Odun Road, Appledore this Summer!

The museum has been delighting visitors for forty years, but many local people have yet to sample its exhibitions. Those who do are often surprised and pleased to find that our local distinctiveness is so well preserved. In the words of one visitor,'You don't have to be a boat addict to appreciate it!'
Opening times are from 10.30am to 4.30 pm . The museum closes at 5 pm , so come early to give yourselves at least one hour to look around. This year it is open every day from April until the end of October; parties are most welcome by appointment at any time.
Exhibits are regularly updated and we aim to add one each year. This year photos from the archive have been displayed to show the Instow to Appledore ferry in operation going back to the beginning of the last century, and also photographs of the timber trade in the 19th and 20th centuries.
One of our most popular current exhibits illustrates the 'Top Secret' experimental work which was carried out on our coast and estuary during the build-up to the D Day invasion of Europe in 1944. This includes film and photographs of these experiments which involved the first British frogmen, PLUTO-pipeline under the ocean and all types of strange equipment which was needed to get tanks and other vehicles through the 'water-gap' between the ships and the shore ... continued on page 2.

The museum is run by a dedicated team of local historians, artists, researchers, archivists and all-round enthusiasts to create the much appreciated and award-winning display. Over 50 volunteers give up their spare time to this museum which depicts all aspects of our local maritime history, open for visitors of all ages. Museum staff are constantly gleaning new information for its collections. One recent visitor told of his time in Westward Ho! during World War 2 as an army frogman based at Top Camp on Cornborough Road. He had no knowledge of the existence of the naval frogmen in Appledore!

Every year as a result of continuing research a magazine is published with articles written by local enthusiasts with details of information gleaned, new artefacts collected and reports on the development of the museum. A 'Friends of the Museum' group receives a copy and have free visits.

The museum's archives continue to grow as people come and tell us their stories of their lives or local happenings which they have witnessed.

## 24-hour archery shoot at Pannier Market

We are 50 years old this year and to mark this great occasion we will be holding a 24 -hour sponsored shoot in Bideford's Pannier Market on $23^{\text {rd }}$ and $24^{\text {th }}$ of August, to raise money for the Northern Devon Healthcare Trust Chemotherapy Unit Appeal.
This shoot will start at 5:00 pm on Saturday $\mathbf{2 3}^{\text {rd }}$ August when the Deputy Mayor and Deputy Mayoress of Bideford will blow a whistle to call the archers to the shooting line. Relays of archers will then shoot in 2 hour slots throughout the 24 -hour
 period to $5: 00$ pm on Sunday $24^{\text {th }}$ August, when the Mayor and Mayoress of Northam will blow a whistle to call the shoot to a halt.

We don't know how many arrows will be shot in total, nor do we know the total score that will be achieved.However there will be a "Guess the total Score" competition with the closest guess for the total score scooping a prize of at least $£ 50$.

There will also be an opportunity for members of the public to practise on our 'Have-a-Go' range set up in a different part of the Pannier Market.
We are hoping to raise in excess of $£ 1,000$ from sponsorship and other fund-raising activities towards the Appeal.
Kenwith Company of Archers was formed in September 1964 in the grounds of Kenwith Castle. Over the years we have had a number of temporary homes around the district until in 1991 we were able to buy our own field near Littleham which is now our permanent home and used for target archery throughout the summer months.

## 'The Tortoise and the Hare' by Elizabeth <br> Jenkins (Discussed By Bideford Library Readers' Group.)

This book, first published in 1954, was reprinted by Virago in 2007 with an introduction by Hilary Mantel.
Although very much a book of its time, set just after the end of the war, it explores a theme which could easily be relevant today - the disintegration of a marriage .
We stand helplessly by as Imogen's handsome and domineering husband Evelyn allows his spinster neighbour Blanche to ensnare him by gradual degrees. Several of us in the group likened her to the spider in the corner gradually weaving a web from which neither Isobel nor Evelyn could escape.
Isobel, the tortoise of the story believes that her beauty and good looks will always win the day and that Evelyn could not possibly be attracted to the masculine and dowdy, but fiercely practical, Blanche. How wrong she proved to be. Us readers also find it hard to believe, but there is an ominous finality about the gradual unravelling of Evelyn's marriage by Blanche, something akin to a slow motion train crash.
It made compelling but chilling reading. Isobel is a lost soul whose main attractions, looks and sensibility, are no match for the insensitve, competent, unlovely Blanche.
The group were (almost) in general agreement that it was an excellent book, beautifully written with some wonderful descriptions of nature and the English landscape. However some found it difficult to sympathise with the characters. I have since read 'Harriet' by Elizabeth Jenkins, another excellent read, but here again the main characters are rather unlikeable!

## The Met Office Reported by András Droppa

On Friday $6^{\text {th }}$ of June, 18 selected students from Bideford College went to the Met Office in Exeter, the UK's top weather forecasting station. We were put into groups named after famous scientists, had an introductory talk, and put our things in our tents. After food we met the 36 students from the other schools. Next we started our first 6 activities of the day, doing things like how to 'make clouds' and calculating average temperatures for different parts of the country. The highlight of that evening was probably the Supercomputer. It does 1.4 trillion calculations every second and looks almost like a load of school lockers. The whole computer is the size of 2 football fields. They have to put half the computer in 1 room the size of the 2 football fields and the other half in a room almost exactly the same. This is for 2 reasons: firstly, if something happens to 1 computer (for example a fire) then the other one can keep giving vital forecasts to the rest of the world and the other reason is because the super computer gets so hot that it needs its own fan just to cool it down. That's just half a super computer. We then learnt a bit about climate until we finally fell asleep at 1 o'clock in the morning!
We woke up at 7am and went straight into science again after breakfast. First we learnt about people's jobs at the Met office, including being a student there. Then we went into reporting weather and even got to do our own report in front of a green screen. We also learnt about satellites and atmospheric temperature. We saw the objects they use to send up to measure the atmospheric temperature and found out the ratio of the atmosphere to the earth. Finally we learnt about the places where people work and what they do in those places; including their roles, their forecasting expertise and how much coffee they consumed in a day. We then received certificates and a small bag containing different experiments to try ourselves. We all learnt something and enjoyed the experience of seeing professional scientists exploring the mad world of weather.

## News from the Burton Art Gallery and Museum. in August

We hope it continues to be our 'glorious summer' - full of things to do at the Burton, particularly for children during the holidays.


On August the $5^{\text {th }}$, they can create Mechanical Models with moving parts from card and paint. That sounds like fun; as does another day course on the $13^{\text {th }}$, where all sorts of throw-away objects such as bags and plastic bits and pieces can be made into 'Up-Cycles'.
On the $\mathbf{2 2}^{\text {nd }}$ August, 'Ship Ahoy' comes into port, and children can make a seaside scene or a ship - in a bottle. The secret will be out at last.
On the $\mathbf{2 7}^{\text {th }}$ they will be seen making 'Fat and Flat Fish' - 3D paper models, and on the 29 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, a fish or insect out of a sock - a 'Windsock Animal' in fact. Why not? All these courses start at 10 am , end at 4 pm, and cost $£ 15$ for the day.

Adults have not been forgotten, and in conjunction with the current exhibition by The Society of Wood Engravers, there is a day course on Saturday, $9^{\text {th }}$ August, when Ben Goodman, who has exhibited at the Royal Academies of London and Bristol, will take a course for beginners. The cost is $£ 35$, plus $£ 20$ for the materials. When you have looked around this stunning exhibition, you may well be inspired to try this skill for yourself.
The other day course on $30^{\text {th }}$ August is - 'Wood Engraving Master Class' taken by Past President of the Royal Society of Painter-Printmakers, Hilary Paynter, who has exhibited her meticulous and skilful engravings all over the UK and beyond. Students will need basic drawing materials, a sketch book and a old paperbacks to rest the block on. The fee for the day is $£ 35$, and $£ 10$ for additional materials supplied by Hilary. Time: 10am to 4pm.
The 76 th Exhibition of Wood Engravers continues in the Gallery until $15^{\text {th }}$ September. The Society was founded by a group of artists, including Eric Gill, Robert Gibbings and Lucien Pissaro, and now numbers around 70 members, all of whom are practising artists in Britain and abroad.

Last month the Friends announced an Art Auction in the Gallery on the $24^{4 \text { th }}$ September, this year. Unfortunately, this has had to be postponed until next year, as there is not a convenient room to hold it comfortably in the Gallery at that time. The main exhibition for the months of October to December will be in the process of being set up, and the Friends are content to await a more suitable date for the Auction in 2015. But if you do have anything you would like to sell, please put it on one side and watch this space!

In the meantime, we hope you will enjoy the exhibitions, the Craft Gallery, the Museum, the Shop and the Cafe du Parc, which opens onto Victoria Park. It is good to see so many people sitting at tables outside, eating scrumptious food, while watching families enjoying the best Park in North Devon. We hope the weather will continue to be kind!

## John Wesley's visit to Bideford

The Reverend John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church visited Bideford in October 1757.As was his custom he had toured Cornwall on horseback (then aged 54) returning to Bristol via Launceston, St Mary Week and Bideford.

He wrote in his journal : Monday $3^{\text {rd }}$ October 1757.
'I rode to Bideford but did not reach it till after five, the hour appointed for my preaching. So I began without delay, in an open part of the street, where we alighted. One man made a little noise at first, but he was easily silenced. All the rest (a large number) quietly attended, though the wind was piercing cold...
The next day from Bideford riding to North Molton, then Tiverton, arriving at Bristol on the $8^{\text {th }}$ through heavy rain, brightening later. He wrote much of his correspondence whilst in the saddle. Wesley, an ordained Anglican priest, began open air preaching in Kingswood, Bristol in 1739. He ventured on this strange way of preaching in the fields, following the American pattern.Churches or halls were not big enough to accommodate the thousands who came to hear him. He would stand on a raised eminence in the corner of a field, allowing the wind to carry his voice to the congregation.
The reception was not always friendly as the riots in Wednesbury, West Midlands on 1783 record.A man, small in stature, he continued his journeys well into old age, travelling in later life by post chaise. He died aged 88. Peter Nock

## 100 years ago

"Your King and Country needs you". (Bideford Gazette August 1914)


The Motor Omnibus service from Bideford to Clovelly and Hartland has been inaugurated. Mr Henry Sowden is in charge. The cars are 21 feet in length and coloured green.

The programme of events for the London Bidefordian Society has been published. The subscription is 2 s 6 d for gentlemen and 1s 6d for ladies. Mr R S Chope, Mayor of Bideford, is President.
On 11 August the Government's official Declaration of War was published in the Gazette. The $6^{\text {th }}$ Devon Territorials entrained for Barnstaple to join the war effort, as did the members of the Royal North Devon Hussars. In Bideford Market Square, tradesmen, farmers and owners paraded their horses. The Re-mount officers who needed horses for their regiments made their selections and a good price was paid for the horses taken.
The Mayor took out an advert reassuring Bideford people that food supplies are sufficient for ordinary demands. He encouraged frugality and requested that townsfolk did not draw more cash from the banks than was normally necessary. Thirty new special constables are being recruited.
On 18 August the front page of the Gazette carried a call to arms headed "Your King and Country needs you". (From Bideford and District Archives)

## Musical Hops (From our Arts Correspondent)

How do you play a Kangaroo on the violin? Connie and Ruby showed the audience in a little showcase of solos by young musicians at St Peter's Church, Fremington last month.

The young children - Connie is six years old and Ruby, seven started with a Kangaroo hop impression by plucking the violin's strings ('pizzicato'). They finished with 'A Restful Tune' demonstrating their prowess with the bow. Lauren, nine, from Newport Primary played 'Hills and Dales' while at the other end of the spectrum a very mature (but still only 19!) Emily Bogiatis played a Scottish solo, and Bideford College student Charlotte McLean gave us a lively piece with a Greek flavour, which increased in tempo; Emily Brooks and Darcey Atkinson (both 13) gave performances 'in the style of Vivaldi' by Kuchler.

All of the players are taught by Keith Chivers; Lottie Price, 16, who played part of a lovely Bach partita is the leader of North Devon Strings which Keith directs, and Rose McKinnel (14), who played music by Leclair, is in the sister Concert Strings orchestra, of which Darcey, at such a young age, is leader.

With encouragement and lots of practice, these talented youngsters might, like Emily Bogiatjis, progress to music college - in her case from Kingsley School, Bideford to the Birmingham conservatoire.

It must be something in the water that nurtures the wealth of musical talent that Devon produces - from punk rock to classical - but it might also be down to the North Devon Music Centre at Park Community School which brings together these young string players, and other instrumentalists, from beginner to advanced, and runs orchestras, bands and ensembles in which they can make music together. The Centre is open to anyone from north, mid or west Devon who plays or would like to play an instrument. It meets on Wednesday from 5-7pm at Park School, in Barnstaple. The earlier players start their instrument, the better. 'If I said "Kangaroo" to a gathering of violinists I have taught over the years,' Keith said, 'they could still play it.'

This summer, squid is everywhere in Bideford Bay and the local fishing boats are landing it into the Appledore Fish Dock most days -no need to go to Spain for your calamari!!
Here is a BBG recipe for Stuffed Squid.

## Calamari with Two Tomato Stuffing

 Ingredients - for cooking on the BBQ or in the oven!Serves 4
$500 \mathrm{gms} / 11 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$ baby squid (you can but these cleaned)
1 clove garlic, crushed
3 plum tomatoes, skinned and chopped
8 sun-dried tomatoes in oil, drained and chopped
60/4tbsp chopped fresh basil I+ extra
60/4tbsp fresh breadcrumbs
45/3tbsp olive oil
15/1tbsp red wine vinegar
salt and freshly ground pepper
lemon juice, to serve
Method
1.-Clean the Squid and chop off the tentacles and
keep to add to the stuffing
2. Soak the cocktail sticks in cold water before use 3. Mix together the garlic, chopped plum tomatoes, chopped sundried tomatoes and breadcrumbs. Stir in the salt and pepper and chopped tentacles. Stir in 1 tbsp. of oil and the vinegar.
4. With a teaspoon fill the main part of the squid.

Secure with the soaked cocktail sticks.
5. Brush the squid with the remaining oil and cook over a medium -hot BBQ for 4-5 minutes turning often or bake in a medium- hot oven-6/7 gas 200/220C for 10 mins.
6, Sprinkle with lemon juice and extra basil to serve.
